ABOUT THE FARM.

Sixty-two degrees is the best temperature to which milk can be set, but the surroundings must be perfect.

Within a range equal to the height of trees, the growth of most crops will be lessened. Beyond this limit, and for a distance seven times as great as the height of the screen, there will be a decided benefit to most crops, and especially to those liable to be injured by high winds.

The reason why many farmers fail to hit the mortgage from the farm is for want of a definite plan of action. All farmers who have removed such encumbrances are those who have raised some special crop or kind of live stock, with the express idea of thus reducing the indebtedness. The ordinary proceeds of the farm were devoted to the living of the family and the payment of interest.

The largest profits are realized from dairy butter by the men who supply their butter to families each week, and at a fixed price for the season. This method is certainly the most satisfactory to consumers as well as to the dairyman. The consumer can depend on a regular supply of good butter of uniform quality. If they run short and find it necessary to buy a little store butter, the comparison only leads them to a better appreciation of fresh dairy butter. The dairyman has regular sale for a given amount of butter, and can determine when to add new customers or dismiss some. He pays no grocer for handling his product, and can command a uniform price for a good article.

OFFICIAL PROGRAMME OF Ontario Provincial Winter Fair, December 7 to 17, 1908.

Lectures are arranged for the patrons of the Winter Fair of 1908 to make a special feature of the cause, prevention and treatment of common ailments of horses, cattle, and sheep. It has been considered by the executive of the Winter Fair that a series of lectures on this subject would be of great interest to live stock raisers. For a number of years there have been addresses delivered at the Winter Fair dealing with the breeding of live stock, proper type, feeding for profit, markets and how to supply them, etc. This year it was decided that considerable time could profitably be spent in a discussion of the ailments which are most frequently the cause of loss to owners of live stock, taking up not only their treatment, but also preventive measures, and, so as to assist in a better understanding of the disease, the causes most likely to produce the disease, will be explained. The speakers will be veterinarians of prominence and other well known men who have had practical experience in raising the different kinds of live stock.

Another subject in which there is great interest at the present time is the pasteurization of whey. The discussion of its effect on the quality of the cheese will interest all cheese factory patrons. Associated with this subject and immediately following it will be given an address on the feeding value of pasteurized whey.

The lectures in the poultry department include an address illustrated with stereopticon views, and a demonstration showing proper trussing. In the Seed Department, special attention is being given to Allalla growing in Ontario which will be discussed from the standpoint of both the grower and the seedsman. Afterwards an address on the Identification of Weeds, will be given with stereopticon views illustrating the weed plants and seeds in their natural colors.

In connection with the sheep subjects a very interesting and practical address is anticipated from Mr. T. D. Wardlow, of Toronto, an expert on Wools.

Lectures will commence at 9.30 a.m. on Wednesday and will continue until Thursday night. Judging of live stock will commence at 2 p.m. on Tuesday and will continue until finished.

ELOPERS WERE CAUGHT.

It requires a man of more than ordinary courage to elope with another man's wife, especially when the latter is accompanied by two children, one aged seven and the other four years. But the necessary man showed up in Owen Sound this week. His name is Thomas Radcliffe, an Englishman who has been in this country about a couple of years. Radcliffe had been a boarder in the house of Mr. Joseph Barlow on Hill street, and on Tuesday Radcliffe, Mrs. Barlow, who is a woman about 35 years of age, and the two children left this town with the intention of travelling all the way to England. They had purchased tickets for the ocean voyage, and had all gone well they would now have been on board the Empress of Ireland on their way to the Old Country. The tickets were taken out in the names of Harry Tenshaw and Annie Henshaw and were both for the same berth. The sum of \$86 was expended on the passage money. But as the sequel will show, things went far from well with the eloping expedition. They were lucky in not being stopped before they got the length of the station for they had the misfortune to meet Mr. Barlow on the way. That individual, however, never for a moment suspected the true state of affairs. He imagined that his wife was simply going to see Radcliffe off at the station, as Radcliffe had previously stated that it was his intention to leave the town. When Barlow reached his home some time later he quickly changed his views on the subject. He discovered that a couple of trunks and a number of his personal belongings had disappeared, and that there were no signs of his wife and family. He immediately went to the police station and informed Chief McAuley, who at once telephoned to have the train searched for the missing parties at Toronto. The result of this communication was that at Parkdale station Radcliffe and Mrs. Barlow and the children were detained by detectives. Constable Anthony Shute was sent down to bring the wanderers back, which he duly did and they appeared before Magistrate Creaser in the police court this morning. Radcliffe, who is anything but a beauty, was charged with abducting the children, while Mrs. Barlow was accused of having stolen some of her husband's personal belongings. Mr. A. G. MacKay acted on behalf of Mrs. Barlow and a strong effort was made by both he and the magistrate to entice Mrs. Barlow to go back and live with her husband. Mrs. Barlow replied that she would rather die than do that, and she understood all endeavors to come to any amicable arrangement with Mr. Barlow. She stated that she could not live with him any longer as it was impossible for them to agree. Mrs. Barlow is a somewhat attractive looking woman and presented a very eat and respectable appearance. She was handed over to the care of Mrs. Francis, who looks after female prisoners, and will remain in Mrs. Francis' house till tomorrow, when she will again appear in court. Radcliffe stated that he had not abducted the children nor had he eloped with Mrs. Barlow. He had simply acted in a friendly manner and was conveying her over to England because she had told him that she could live no longer with her husband. He had paid the passage money. Radcliffe was also remanded until to-morrow, and he offered \$200 bail but the prosecutor stated that he would not agree to allowing him out on bail. Mr. Barlow was in court and seemed very much affected. He kissed his two children, a boy and a girl, affectionately and it was apparent from the manner in which they returned the caress that they loved him. Times.


