SOMEONE WAS BRIBED IS MAGISTRATE'S VIEW

MAGISTRATE CREASOR FINDS CROOK GUILTY OF TWO CHARGES OF ILLEGAL SELLING.—TUCKER IS SET FREE.

Owen Sound, Dec. 11.—Charles Crook, proprietor of the Dominion House, was to-day declared guilty on two charges of illegal liquor selling and fined \$75 and \$50, respectively, with costs. Incidentally Magistrate Creasor said: "To me it is clear that someone bribed these detectives to go away that night. As to who committed the bribery, it has not been brought home, or I would have ordered his arrest at once. Whoever was responsible for it was very foolishly advised."
After referring to the prevalence and evil of perjury, his worship said:
"I am not in favor of these detectives being sent to break the law, at the same time it seems to me one of the necessary evils. Men who break the law can't be caught in any other way, and the government has to send them out."
The detectives struck me favorably and in this case nothing has been brought against the detectives. They have given their evidence clearly and well. But it does not seem to me to be right that a young fellow of the age of young Stewart should be sent out to soak himself with whiskey. With a man matured it may not be so bad but it is wrong for any person to send out a boy as young as Stewart for such work.
As to the railway men from Thorton they had nothing to do with this case. As to Pumble and Hilder, I will have to take their word for it, but I'm satisfied the man left of that train, whether on the cab of the engine or in the stove car, I cannot say. I believe, also, that they were bribed to go away.
As to the purchasing of the tickets, I think Stewart was mistaken in the person. It is clear to me that you, Mr. Tucker, were not the man. A man in your position shouldn't and wouldn't do such a thing. It would have more common sense.
William Stevenson, lessee of the bar at the Coulson House, pleaded guilty. On the plea of counsel, his fine was reduced from \$75 to \$50 and costs.
Investigation was then commenced in two charges brought against William Guardhouse, of the Patterson House. Accused pleaded guilty to the charge on condition that the other was dropped, and the prosecution consented, provided that the maximum penalty of \$100 was paid. Mr. Tucker, accused's counsel, asked that the fine be made \$75, and it was arranged that he communicate with the chief inspector in Toronto on this matter.
This finished the liquor trials. The two charges against T. C. Hutton, druggist, not being taken up. It is understood that these two charges will be dropped, one of the reasons for this being that P. Wall, the missing detective, was the principal witness.
