A Sad Fatality.

(Gore Bay Recorder.) Seldom, if ever before, has the passing of a soul from our midst caused such a cloud of sorrow to settle upon us as in the death of Mr. Dennis Wright, which occurred on Saturday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock.

As announced in The Recorder of last week, Mr. Wright received the wound, which resulted in his death on Wednesday of last week, while working around a lathe machine in Brett's mill across the bay. Mr. Wright was shoving a piece of timber through the machine to cut it into laths. In some way it got lodged in the saw. In trying to get it free one end was raised so that it was caught by the saw and thrown back with terrible force, striking Mr. Wright in the bowels. He was at once placed in a boat, and removed to his home, where medical aid was secured at once. The extent of the pain suffered by the unfortunate man will never be known, but those who were in attendance during the first day and part of the next, were able to see that he was suffering untold agony. The wound was an internal nature, and little could be done to relieve the sufferer. Both local doctors were in attendance and all that medical skill could do was done. On the second day the pain abated, but it was seen that death was near at hand. Up to about the last two hours deceased was conscious of all around him, and knew he could not recover. On Saturday at 5:30 he slept peacefully away. So peaceful was his last moments that those around the deathbed scarcely knew the end had come.

Dennis Wright was born in Norfolk, Eng., 44 years ago. When a boy of ten years he came with his father and mother to Canada, where they settled in Meaford. When twenty-three years of age he met with an accident which cost him the free use of both hands, and to this fact is no doubt due the accident which resulted in his death. He was out for a day's shooting, and becoming tired, stood to rest for a moment. Placing one hand upon the other he placed them on the muzzle of the gun for support. In some manner the bottom of his trouser leg came in contact with the trigger of the gun, the full charge of both barrels of a shotgun entering his hands, literally tearing them to pieces. At that time he was confined to his bed for eight weeks, while food was administered with a spoon.

Seventeen years ago he was married to Mary Alice Cutting, of Markdale. For several years afterward he lived in Elphrasia township, County Grey, moving to Gore Bay about eight years ago. During that time he was very highly thought of and respected by all. He was a man who never shrank from any honest work whereby he could support his wife and family, to whom he was very closely attached. Deceased was never happier than when surrounded by his four small children; the eldest being Mabel, aged 12 years; Julia, aged 10; Willie, aged 5; and Freddie, a bright little lad of about 3 years. Besides a widow, and the above mentioned family he leaves a mother and father, highly respected residents of Ice Lake, and the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Robt. Palmer, Ice Lake; Edgar Wright, Holland Centre; Mrs. Archie Kirkpatrick, Elphrasia Twp.; Will, Ice Lake; Charles, Gore Bay; and Mrs. Will Easton, of Thessalon.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Tate in the English Church on Monday afternoon, after which the remains were laid to rest in Gordon cemetery, the funeral being largely attended. The pallbearers were as follows: James Mastin, James Liddecoat, John Johnston, Robert Robinson, Aaron Walker and Arthur Caniff, all close friends of the deceased.

To the bereaved wife and family we extend the most sincere sympathy, and we can assure them that the gloom cast over them is not their alone. To the father, mother, sisters and brothers is also due the heartfelt sympathy of all in the saddest moments of their lives.
