

FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL.

The newly elected members of Markdale council met on Monday as per statute and before Town Clerk Macpherson made and subscribed the necessary declaration of qualification and of office, as follows: Reeve, W. L. McFarland; Councillors, J. G. Matthews, P. J. Thompson, Albert Jackson and R. W. Ennis. Adjournment was made until 8 p.m., when the full board met, the reeve in the chair.

Thompson—Matthews—That the account of Biggar-Samuel, publishers of Canadian Engineer, re advertising waterworks, be paid and an order be drawn on treasurer for same, \$10.50.—Carried.

Matthews—Ennis—That all supplies for the use of the corporation be purchased by the Chairmen of the committee requiring the same, or by a written order issued by said chairman.—Carried.

Jackson—Matthews—That the Clerk be instructed to procure six copies of the Municipal World, and that an order be drawn on the treasurer for \$5.00 in payment of same.—Carried.

Thompson—Matthews—That by-law No. 200, appointing Auditors, be now read a first and second time.—Carried.

Ennis—Matthews—That by-law No. 200 be filled in with the names of Jas. S. Rowe and J. E. Matson and that the said by-law be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed in by-law book.—Carried.

Jackson—Matthews—That the regular meeting of this council take place on the last Monday in each month at 8 o'clock p.m.—Carried.

Thompson—Ennis—That the Fire, Light and Waterworks Committee be composed of J. G. Matthews, chairman; A. Jackson, P. J. Thompson.—Carried.

Ennis—Thompson—That the Park and Cemetery Committee be composed of A. Jackson, chairman; R. W. Ennis and J. G. Matthews.—Carried.

Jackson—Matthews—That the By-law, Printing and Hall Committee be composed of P. J. Thompson, chairman; J. G. Matthews, R. W. Ennis.—Carried.

Matthews—Thompson—That the Streets and Sidewalks Committee consist of R. W. Ennis, chairman; A. Jackson and P. J. Thompson.—Carried.

Jackson—Ennis—That the Finance Committee be composed of the whole council and that the Reeve be chairman of same.—Carried.

Matthews—Thompson—That E. G. Campbell be and is hereby appointed a director of the Markdale Furniture Co. to represent this municipality on the board of directors of said Co.—Carried.

Thompson—Ennis—That council donate the sum of \$10.00 to the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, and that an order be drawn on Treasurer for same.—Carried.

Matthews—Thompson—That C. Reed be paid the balance due on his salary, \$15.07, and postage, and an order be drawn on Treasurer for same.—Carried.

LATEST MARKET REPORTS.

TORONTO MARKETS:

Toronto, Jan. 13.—Receipts of live stock, as reported by the railways, were 84 cars—1456 cattle, 1278 hogs, 600 sheep and lambs with 40 calves.

The quality of fat cattle were fairly good. Trade was brisk all round, the market being cleaned up in good time.

Exporters—A limited number of exporters found ready sale and more would have been sold had they been offered. Steers sold from \$5 to \$5.50.

Butchers—Prime picked lots of heifers and steers are worth \$4.80 to \$5; loads of good, \$4.40 to \$4.70; medium quality, \$3.75 to \$4.25; cows, \$3 to \$4.25; canners, \$1.50 to \$2.

Feeders and Stockers—H. & W. Murby report light deliveries, all of which were readily taken. The Messrs. Murby bought 50 feeders, 800 to 900 lbs. each at \$3.40 to \$3.70 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers—A moderate delivery of milkers and springers sold from \$50 to \$50 each.

Veal Calves—Receipts of veal calves were not large, and prices were firm at \$3 to \$7 per cwt. and one or two extra quality calves sold as high as \$7.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—The run of sheep and lambs was light, which caused prices to be strong. Sheep ewes, sold at \$3.75 to \$4.25; rams, \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.; lambs, \$5.50 to \$6.35 per cwt.

Hogs—Mr. Harris quoted selects at \$6.40 and \$6.15 l.c.b. cars to drovers at country points.
