men should be saved? He has; He tasted death for every man. The spirit of the father and the spirit of the son said come. Who-soever will may take of the water of life freely. Jesus Christ is the perfect photograph of God Almighty. The Church is the body of Christ. If the body is strong, the ministry of the Church will be strong. The Church of God is a priestly, kingly body. We have priests in the pews as well as in the pulpit. Faithfulness on the part of those who occupy the pews is just as necessary as it is in those who occupy the pulpit. The Archdeacon made a strong plea for unity among the members of the church, without which no minister can successfully perform the work to which he has been called. In the evening the Ven. Archdeacon again occupied the pulpit, speaking on the Laymen's Missionary Movement. He gave the history and origin of the same, sketching briefly the work that had been done and is being done, the object of the movement being to spread the gospel over the whole world within the next quarter of a century. He told how fifty men, from different denominations, at their own expense, had visited all the different missions throughout the world and stated their object, not to establish a new organization, but simply to add an auxiliary to that already existing; to ascertain from each of the various missions how much they had accomplished, and helping them to do more by going out among the adherents asking for their assistance and co-operation. The Laymen's Missionary Movement is perhaps the greatest present-day agency at work for the evangelization of the world, and he hoped that this town would not be found lagging in enthusiasm over the great work which is in hand.

Campbell, director of Markdale Furniture Factory. Jackson—Ennis—That the acct. of A. L. Walker, for lumber for cemetery fence, be paid and an order drawn on treasurer for same. Amount, \$6.40.—Carried. Matthews—Jackson—That the report of L. G. Campbell re cemetery, be accepted and filed for reference.—Carried. Council adjourned.

Death of Mrs. Geo. Buskin.

After failing health for several weeks, Mrs. Buskin, of this place, passed peacefully out of this life on Thursday last, January 21, 1909. Deceased, whose maiden name was Hannah Savage, was born in Markham township the 15th June, 1835, united in marriage with her now bereaved husband, George Buskin, the 30th October, 1855, and came to Artemesia in 1862. She was a faithful, devoted helpmate in the struggles incident to pioneer life, a large hearted, conscientious type of christian character. Having with her husband gained a competency for old age, they retired from the farm fifteen years ago, then removing to Markdale, where the evening of life was pleasantly spent. Three brothers survive, James, Thomas and John, all residing in Ontario, and her family of three sons and one daughter mourn the loss of a loving, affectionate mother, viz: John, of Euphrasia; William, of Guelph; Wesley, on the homestead, and Mrs. Frank R. Blair, of Napinka, Man. Mrs. Buskin, was of a modest, retiring disposition and highly respected by all who came within the circle of her acquaintance. After a service at the home on Saturday p.m., conducted by Rev. A. Shepherd, interment took place at Markdale public cemetery. Messrs. H. Baird, P. McCullough, T. H. Wilson, A. Flewes, John Chard and C. W. Roxledge were the pall bearers.
