Artemesia township council met on Saturday last; all the members present, the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The Auditors' report on accounts for 1908 was presented. By-law No. 710, to appoint a treasurer and define his duties, was introduced and read a first and second time and passed in committee of the whole, and ordered to be entered in the By-law book. The Auditors' report was adopted and ordered to be printed.

Carson — Duncan — That H. B. McLean be paid his account of 90 cts. for repairing grader. — Carried. Duncan — Wright — That the Trustees of School Section No. 13 be paid \$11.35 being surplus of account interest on debentures matured July 1, 1908. — Carried.

JOSEPH KELLIHER'S FATE. Set Fire To His Cell and Burned to Death.—Handcuffed to One Wrist.

Port Elgin, Feb. 13.—Jes. Kelliher met a terrible fate while prisoner in the lockup here last night. When his body was taken out about 8.30 o'clock it was burned so as to be unrecognizable. He had been arrested on a charge of being disorderly. Flames were seen issuing from the cell window but before anyone could reach the unfortunate man he was dead. When taken out there was a handcuff on one wrist. It is presumed that in some manner fire caught the mattress on which the prisoner was lying. It is thought death was caused by smothering. Kelliher was about thirty-five years of age and came here from Grey some months ago.
