**Artemesia Council.**

Artemesia Council met on Saturday, March 6th, with all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of session of Feb. 6th last were read and confirmed. An account from Mrs. McArthur for gravel used on roads was presented and read. Messrs. McKenzie and Carson as a committee to inquire into the treasurer's securities presented their report. The securities consist of a bond of the London Guarantee Company for \$4000 with premium paid to Feb. 1910. Bylaws 711, to appoint certain municipal officers, and 712 to amend bylaw 710 were introduced and read a first and second time. Bylaw 711 was read a third time and ordered to be signed and entered on the Bylaw Book.

**Duncan - Wright** - That the committee report on the treasurer's securities be received and adopted. Carried.

**Carson - McKenzie** - That Mrs. McArthur be paid \$8.90 for gravel used on road, as certified by overseer for 1907 and 1908. Carried.

The C. P. Railway Company's engineers served on the council copies of plans of railway crossings on the W. & L. branch of the C.P.R. for approval or objection within ten days.

**McKenzie - Duncan** - That the reeve and Mr. Carson examine the railway crossings on the W. & L. branch of the C.P.R. and forward a copy of their report to the chairman of the Railway Committee through the township solicitor by the 14th inst. Carried.

**Wright - Duncan** - That in the opinion of this council the time has come when this council should invest in a stone crusher, and the clerk is hereby authorized to communicate with different manufacturers with a view of purchasing the same. Carried.

**McKenzie - Carson** - That \$1240 be appropriated to be expended on the highways of this township in 1909 as follows: said sum to include work on town lines: Div. 1, \$300; Div. 2, \$300; Div. 3, \$340; Div. 4, \$300; and the members of this council are appointed commissioners to expend the same in their respective divisions, this appropriation not to include work on bridges costing over \$25. The said commissioners are required to submit their report in writing to this council of such expenditure before being paid their commission; that the sum of \$175 be expended on the valley road between Loncks' mill and the townline of Euphrasia, and the reeve expend the same. Carried.

The reeve and commissioner of division in which work on bridge costing over \$25 be a committee to oversee the work, and no further expenditure be made on new bridges except in cases of emergency, save by resolution of this council, and that a bylaw be prepared and submitted at the next meeting of this council.

Council adjourned.

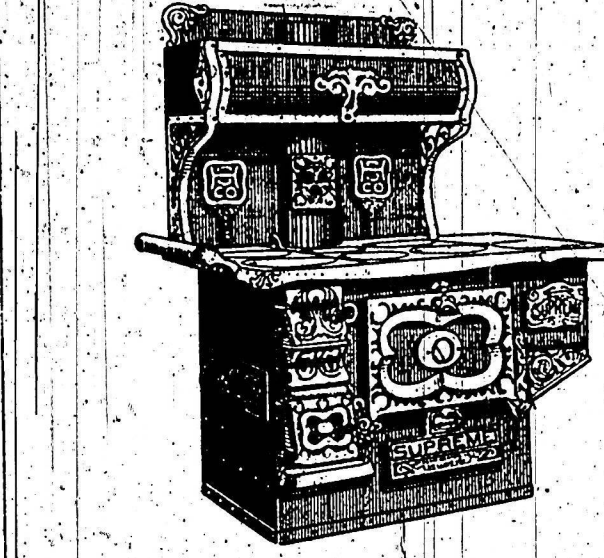
