Grand Jury's Presentment.

The following is the presentment of the Grand Jury. To His Lordship Justice Britton: May it Please Your Worship—We the members of the Grand Jury in attendance at the Spring Assizes of the County of Grey, beg leave to make the following report to your Lordship:

We find pleasure in reporting that there are no criminal cases to come before this Grand Jury and we congratulate this County on the apparent absence of crime of a serious nature.

Upon visiting the County gaol we are pleased to report that we find this institution in the usual clean, proper and well-regulated prison of which Mr. Miller, the gaoler, is characteristic of keeping. We find there is at present 19 prisoners, 18 being males, and 1 female. They are classified as being vagrants 5, insane 3, theft 10.

We find that one person has been confined in this gaol since May 1906 as insane and one since February 1909, and we would recommend that some provision be made to remove the person confined since May 1906 to a provincial asylum for the insane, or if not insane have the person discharged. The other two persons confined in the gaol as insane we are of the opinion from the observations we have made and from enquiry as to their condition that they are not violent or dangerous and should not be confined in gaol but should be at once removed to an asylum for treatment or discharged.

We have also visited the House of Refuge for this County at Markdale and we find sheltered therein 16 inmates, 10 being males and 6 females.

We find that this County has provided the aged and unfortunate with a very humane and comfortable shelter. We find this institution, under the management of Mr. Harness, to be of the most satisfactory nature.
