## AMENDMENTS TO LIQUOR LICENSE ACT.

Sweeping Changes Looking for Better Enforcement of Law in Local Option Districts.—Erectory Sales Will Be Stopped.

Hon. W. J. Hanna's amendments to the Liquor License Act were laid before the House on Wednesday afternoon. As expected, they embody a number of sweeping changes all tending toward better enforcement of the Act, especially in Local Option districts.

Probably the most important amendment, affecting Local Option districts, is the provision for licensing bar-less hotels. The License Commissioners are given power to issue licenses, and regulate hotels in local option districts in the same manner as in other districts. The licensee must pay a nominal license of \$5 a year, but the license may be transferred without extra charge. The licenses may be issued in sufficient numbers to meet the requirements of local conditions, but in no greater numbers than reasonable in the estimation of the Board of License Commissioners. The accommodation shall be the same as that of other hotels, as nearly as possible, but upon the resolution of the board, stabling accommodation may be dispensed with.

The authority of the Provincial Inspector, Mr. W. K. Snyder, recently appointed, has been increased by a provision which says that he shall have power:

"To visit and inspect any tavern or hotel for which a license has been issued, and the accommodation provided therein, and the utensils, bedding, and other furniture, to see that the laws of the province providing for the protection, safety and health of guests and other inmates are complied with, and to give directions in writing to the licensee-holder as to providing other or additional accommodations, furniture and appliances, or as to any other matter he may deem necessary for the safety, comfort and convenience of the guests."

The "blind pig" operator will find cold comfort in the provisions directed more especially at his business. The penalty for a first offence has been doubled, the minimum fine now being \$50 instead of \$25, and the maximum \$200 instead of \$100. The penalty of a second offence is increased to six months' imprisonment.

Another provision that will place a powerful weapon in the hands of the "blind pig" destroyers is the authority to seize suspected liquor in transit.

The inspectors on many occasions come upon large quantities of liquor, sent up, for instance, on the Government railway, which they are morally certain is intended for illegal use. On one occasion they seized several barrels at an express office, but it was found that they had exceeded their authority. The law allowed a seizure only in the place where it was intended for sale not at transit points. On the direction of the minister, liquor so seized may be sold to any licensee-holder and the proceeds after payment of costs, turned into the Provincial Treasury.

The "keg party" will be a thing of the past around Owen Sound and other local option districts if the proposed restrictions on brewers are carried out. The law has been amended so that brewers shall be prevented from selling by retail in local option districts, and may sell to the trade only.

On the whole, the amendments are well calculated to strengthen the hands of temperance. But the "three-fifths" clause still stands.

In moving the second reading of the bill, Hon. Mr. Hanna went over the measure in detail, explaining it clause by clause. One change, the provincial secretary announced, was the Government's decision to take to itself the right to cancel the license of any hotel man who failed to properly equip his house and keep it in a sanitary condition. It was also proposed to limit to 30 days the time in which any non-license holder could enter an appeal under the act. In support of this limitation Mr. Hanna pointed out that the licensee-holder was already limited to ten days to enter his appeal against conviction.

"Then why not make both alike?" suggested Hon. Mr. McKay. "It might well be," responded the Minister, "and that is a point we will leave open for discussion."

Continuing Mr. Hanna said that the brewers' right to retail had been abused and had resulted in the clause providing that the brewers' license carried the right to sell to

the trade only. Hon. Mr. McKay said he was glad that the Government had at last adopted the plan to license temperance houses.

He saw no reason for restricting temperance licensed hotels to local option districts and places where there were no licensed houses. "If I thought the temperance hotel should be made general. Continuing, Mr. McKay questioned the wisdom of the clause compelling minors to swear where they secured their liquor. "I'm afraid it will lead to much perjury," he observed. Mr. Hanna observed that the three-fifths local option clause was under consideration.

#### WOMEN TAKING UP.

The "New Zealand Herald," Auckland, says: "I have never seen our citizens more different as to the best means of promoting temperance, there is no gain-saying the fact that the advocates of the no-license are gaining and not being found. The no-license cause has been considerably enlarged in this province in a number of electorates which refused to give the necessary three-fifths majority for no-license, and everywhere the voting was heavy for what impartial citizens must agree to be an experiment. The reason for this may not be far to seek. It has hitherto been taken for granted that the enfranchisement had had no particular effect upon the political situation, but the licensing question has been largely taken up by a very large number of women and it may well be doubted whether the no-license vote would have been what it is had women been excluded.

#### NO BARS IS BETTER.

The "Ottawa Times": "The movement for the extinction of licenses is steadily marching forward. It is easy to suggest special reasons for the extraordinary success of the prohibitionists in some localities where the brewers have been disposed to flout public opinion. It is also considerations cannot be taken into account for the general increase in the no-license vote. The restriction seems to be growing. There is nothing to be gained by ignoring the fact—that the absence of open bars makes for the improvement of social conditions. Ten years hence, at the present pace of progress, the no-license vote will have New Zealand at its mercy." Indeed, that development may come much earlier, because every poll would add to the number of "dry" districts and would correspondingly reduce the fighting strength of the license party.
