COMPLETED PURCHASE OF BAIRD PROPERTY

(Continued from page 1.)

several milling propositions from the west and wished to have the matter settled before he went West to look into the same. Mr. Ford stated that his contract with the town for the Baird property calls for free pumping for five years. He has secured a most reliable man, Mr. Robert McFally, to operate the pumping plant, and had fully carried out his part of the agreement.

Councillor Ennis thought that as the town was under contract to put in a waterworks system, and as there were no other apparent supplies than those mentioned, he was inclined to think that the Baird property may as well be purchased.

If he believed the sinking of the wells would be \$2,000 cheaper than the other supply proposition, he thought the old council was a little hasty in letting the contracts for the waterworks before they were sure of where the water was coming from.

Councillor Matthews remarked that they saved the town considerable money by closing the contracts when they did, as material had greatly advanced in price since.

Councillor Jackson said that galvanized piping was never so cheap as it was at the present time.

Mr. John McDuff, who has been secured as inspector of the waterworks system, was present, and, as spoken by the reeve, to express his opinion on the point under discussion, said that he considered the contracts for excavating and piping were very satisfactory.

Councillor Matthews believed we have enough power at the Baird mill for waterworks and also for electric lighting purposes if we so required it. He was not advocating that at present, as our electric light service was very satisfactory, but he was looking forward to the future.

We had had two of the most eminent engineers in Ontario—Messrs. Mitchell and Aitkens—reporting on this question, and they were of the opinion that Markdale's only available water supply was in the immediate vicinity where tests had been made.

Councillor Matthews drew up the following resolution:

"That the town solicitor be and is hereby instructed to search the title and draw up the necessary papers to complete the transfer of the Baird property to the town, and the Reeve and Clerk are hereby empowered to sign any and all necessary papers to that effect."

Councillor Thompson immediately proposed an amendment that the council defer the matter until an official analysis of the water was received from the Provincial Board of Health.

Councillor Matthews' motion being placed before the council, it was declared carried by the following vote:
