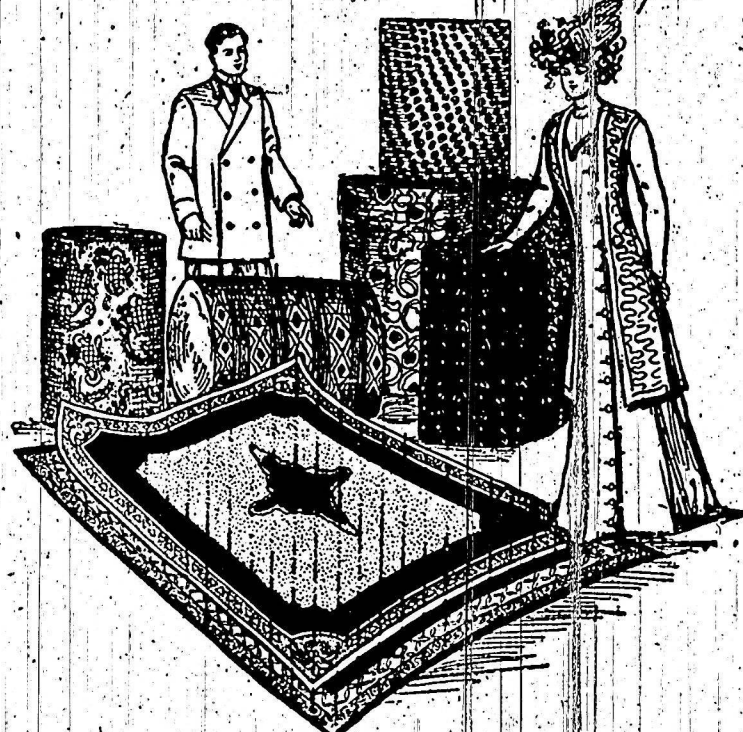

ICE JAM STILL HOLDS

The Niagara Situation Was Unchanged Last Night.

Estimate of Damage Done to Power Works Machinery Places It at One Million Dollars—Change Is Going on But Break-Up Is Very Gradual—Five Miles of Lower River Is Submerged in Ice Heaps.

Niagara Falls, April 13.—Conditions in the lower river are practically the same, and unless heavy winds blow more ice down the river to-day the damage done by the ice jam in the lower river will not exceed that already estimated, which totals at a reasonable estimate one million dollars. Already, before the jam has perceptibly started to break up, the gorge railroad has put a gang of 250 men at work repairing that portion of the track above the whirlpool, which can be reached. The lower portion is still submerged for five miles under millions of tons of ice. Yesterday morning a small section of the pack below the whirlpool broke away and swung out into the river. Then other sections broke off and the jam is now growing smaller. The change is going on very gradually. It is thought that when the rest of the jam goes out the whole gorge track from Whirlpool to Lewiston may be carried away. The ice is breaking away in great masses of a lot or more and sections of the tracks are being carried away, poles and wire following the rails and ties into the river. Near the Cornell House, in Lewiston, the ice is piling still higher, although it is the river, 40 feet above the level of the falls.

At the Ontario Power Co. hundreds of men are busy cleaning the machinery, which was flooded with ice and water on Saturday. The plant is now free from ice, and the machines are being dried, and until the power-house is opened for a full load, the Canadian Niagara Power Co. and Electrical Development Co. are supplying power to the disabled company.

The conditions in the river just below the falls changed yesterday. The ice bridge has worn away from the base of the cataracts and a huge bank of ice extends half way across the river above the upper bridge. The ice at this point is over ten feet above the normal level, having fallen about 30 feet.

Flood Peril in St. Lawrence.

Montreal, April 13.—Last night the ice in the river opposite the city began to move down the river at the Boucherville Islands. It jammed with the consequence that in less than half an hour the water at the lower end of the city rose eight feet, covering the high level wharves which are supposed to be above the high water mark.

The civic pumping stations have so far been able to keep the water out of the cellars along the river front. On the other side of the river some fifty families in Longueuil have been flooded out and considerable damage has been done to property.

Bridgeworker Blown to Death.

New York, April 13.—John Mo-Shune, a young structural ironworker of Brooklyn, was killed yesterday by falling from the unfinished structure of the Manhattan Bridge over the East river. The counting on a compressed air pipe burst beneath him and blew him off the structure. He landed 110 feet below in a backyard. A heavy projecting plank which the man struck half-way down in his fall, broke under him like a water. Another workman ducked the force of the explosion and managed to keep from falling by clinging desperately to the structure.

Little Girl's Trip.

St. Thomas, April 13.—Mary Manning, the 13-year-old daughter of Jas. Manning of this city, has arrived here made the entire journey alone. Her father had not seen her since she was an infant, when her mother having died, he put her in a convent and came to Canada. Recently he heard of her and succeeded in getting permission to have her come to this country.

Serious Riots in France.

Mers, France, April 13.—The striking button makers of Mers, whose demands for a continuation of the previous wage scale in the button factories, have been followed by violence and disorders, recalling the days of the revolution, have brought about a veritable reign of terror here, and in the neighboring towns of Crepin and Ormaison. About 2,500 soldiers and police are under arms.

Tug Captain Drowned.

Meaford, April 13.—Capt. John McInnis, owner of the fishing tug Primrose, fell overboard and was drowned off Cape Rich, in rounding which boats are compelled to run for some distance in the trough of the sea. The deck being coated with ice, McInnis lost his balance while going from the pilot house to the engine room. He leaves a wife and three young children.
