Mr. John Urquhart, late principal of the public school, has been engaged to take charge of the continuation classes in the Thessalon school. Geo. Whitten and James McManaman, of Melancthon, came to town on April 1st and took on a load of bore. Chief Hemphill, with some assistance, got them in to the lock-up where they spent the night. Before P. McGregor, Police Magistrate, they had to answer to the charges of using bad language on the streets, and a second charge against McManaman of interfering with the constable, in the discharge of his duties, and resisting arrest. Whitten was fined \$5.00 and costs, and McManaman \$25.00 and costs. They settled. When Chief Hemphill visited the town hall Monday morning he discovered that Alex. He had torn the blanket into ribbons and had tied them together, making a rope with which to hang himself. Police Magistrate McGregor committed him to Owen Sound jail, to where he was conveyed on the noon train Monday. James Fachnie, who is also confined here awaiting papers, appears to be getting along fine and gives his keeper very little trouble.
