TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The Lady Grey has arrived at Montreal and reports the river free of ice to the sea.

The trial of Capt. Peter Hains, who is accused of murdering W. E. Annis, began at Flushing, L. I., yesterday.

It is proposed at Washington to break the Patten wheat corner by admitting Canadian grain free for a time.

Two hundred lady teachers arrived at Guelph to take a three months' course in the Ontario Agricultural College.

A note found among the papers of John Davidson, the missing Scottish poet, indicates that he has committed suicide.

An unconfirmed report has reached St. Petersburg of the massacre of 2,000 persons by Turcoman tribesmen at Astrabad.

John Neville was committed for trial at Hamilton on the charge of shooting Constable Smith with intent. Smith swore the prisoner was the man who shot him.

James Johnston's allegation at the Port Frances lumber inquiry that all lumber companies robbed the Government by making false returns of stumpage will be investigated by Hon. Frank Cochrane.

To Face Murder Charge.

Toronto, April 20.—A charge of murder will likely be laid against a French-Canadian, whom Provincial Inspector Greer arrested at North Bay on April 3.

Last fall Gagnon, while under the influence of liquor, entered the house of Ethel Crawford on the outskirts of Cobalt, and brutally beat her and a companion, Mary E. Smith, about the head with an axe.

The Smith woman is dead in St. Michael's Hospital, as the result of the injuries inflicted by Gagnon. Her jawbone was broken and suppuration set in. A portion of the decayed bone was removed, but owing to an impoverished physical condition, general tuberculosis followed, resulting in death.

Gagnon is now in jail at North Bay, after a long pursuit by Inspector Greer over the northern part of the province.

Ferry Adrift.

Buffalo, April 20.—The ferryboat Niagara, running between Buffalo and Port Hope, Ont., was caught in the ice yesterday morning and was carried down the Niagara river to the International Bridge, where its top deck and pilot house were carried off when it came in contact with the bridge. There were but few passengers on the boat, and while there was a panic on the boat, no person was injured. The tug International finally got a line to the Niagara and towed her to the Canadian side.

Protest Against Hon. Mr. Fisher.

Montreal, April 20.—The trial of the protest against the election of Hon. Sidney Fisher took place yesterday at Sweetburg. It was mostly a legal matter. The plaintiffs charged all the offences under the election law, but the evidence was little and not sensational.

The defence was technical, on the ground that the writ had not been served within the time allowed by the law.

Judge Demers took the case on deUber.

Murder the Verdict.

Moosajaw, Sask., April 20.—The adjourned inquest to discover the cause of Mrs. Kent's death opened yesterday morning and after hearing evidence for over two and a half hours, the jury retired to find a verdict.

"That Mrs. Kent came to her death by strychnine poisoning given or sent by some party or parties unknown with intent to kill. Beyond showing almost conclusively that murder had been committed, no new light was thrown on the case.

Drops Dead at Prison Door.

Montreal, April 20.—William Larroque, who was released from St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary in 1906 on ticket-of-leave, with eight years of sentence for robbery yet to run, died on Saturday.

He had drifted back into his old ways again and had been arrested at Rimouski and was taken back to the penitentiary to serve out his sentence. When on the threshold he dropped dead.

Ridgetown Man Murdered.

Windsor, April 20.—John Maroon, one of the best-known young men of this city was arrested and locked up in Detroit, charged with having caused the death of Albert Clark, aged 35, of Ridgetown. The man became engaged in an altercation in Elliott's saloon, on Congress street, and Maroon, it is said, struck Clark a heavy blow. When picked up his skull was fractured.

If your sidewalk, gate or fence needs repairing, fix it.

If your advertising sign is old or faded, take it down or paint it.

Resolve never to throw paper in the street.

Take all the dandelions out of your lawn, they spoil its beauty.

Destroy the young weeds that are straying on your property and on your neighbor's property.

Burn all the rubbish possible, allow no one to throw it on streets, alleys or vacant lots.

Promise not to spit on the sidewalks.

Organize a block improvement society, and allow no weeds to grow on sidewalk area or vacant property in your block.

Irrespective of the size of your house, make your lawn the finest.

Illuminate the front of your store in the business section.

A very few dollars spent individually in paint or repairs, make a great many dollars worth of improvement. This proceeding carried out collectively makes an old town like a brand new town, up-to-date, just taken out of its hand-box, attractive to the eye and an inducement to people to settle in such a pleasant place.

NEW HOTEL FOR TORONTO

Up-to-date Structure Planned at a Cost of \$1,500,000.

A new mill hotel, described as the most modern structure of its kind in America, will be started within three months in Toronto, on the site of the present Yonge street building, from Yonge street through Victoria street, the site being owned by the City of Toronto. Some of the hotels will be the group of hotels which can do all their shopping under the hotel roof. The building will face to the south and will be sheltered by a prominent front on Yonge to Victoria street. The building will be ten stories high, and of red brick, with white trimmings. The hotel will create its own power and light, and the hotel will be finished in the summer.

There will be 1,500 rooms all told. A Turkish bath will also be a feature.

The billiard and lounge will be on the second floor, and will occupy the top room in connection with a banquet hall. And, some thing new in the hotel will be a roof garden.
