BOYLES ARE PUNISHED
Whittie Kidnapper Gets Life and His Wife 25 Years.

Young Couple Who Stole Son of a Wealthy Pennsylvanian Are Given Heavy Penalty—Man Issues a Confession In Which He Charges Another Man With Crime—Says Mr. Whittie, Promised Him Immunity.
Mercer, Pa., May 11.—James Boyle was sentenced yesterday to life imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary at Pittsburg for the kidnapping of "Willie" Whittie.
Mrs. Boyle, indicted as Mary Doe, received a sentence of 25 years with a fine of \$5,000 and costs of the prosecution.
Judge Williams, in imposing sentence, pointed to Boyle's bad record for larceny, assault and jail-breaking.
Last night Boyle issued a sensational statement, implicating Harry Parker of Charon, Pa., in the kidnapping, and asserting that he had turned over incriminating letters to Mr. Whittie under promise of immunity from prosecution. Both men last night

The statement is a willful and malicious lie. Yesterday afternoon District Attorney Livingston said that the kidnapping was still under investigation and that if any third party was found implicated he would be prosecuted without fear or favor.
It is said a razor was found concealed in Boyle's clothing and that his wife last night took a large quantity of morphine.
In the penitentiary last night they bade each other an affectionate farewell. They cannot meet again.
The confession winds up with a plea for Mrs. Boyle.
"I had informed my wife the boy was brought in order to escape being quarantined in the pest-house and we were to be handsomely rewarded for taking care of him. This unfortunate woman was duped from start to finish in regard to the boy."

Lost Two of the Crew.
Halifax, N.S., May 11.—With her flag flying at half mast for the loss of two of her crew, the Mahone Bay schooner Minnie Mosher, in command of Capt. Clarence Mosher, reached Canso yesterday from the fishing banks.
The two men, Andrew Munro and Jeffrey Ferguson of Dover, Guysboro County, were lost last Wednesday on the western banks.

Girl Stopped at the Border.
Detroit, Mich., May 11.—Pretty and well-dressed Anna May Kennedy, aged 16, whose home is in Paris, Ont., was stopped by the American immigration officers at Port Huron because her story of going to visit her grandparents in Mayville, Mich., did not balance with a telegram from the girl's parents. She was taken home.

True Bill Against Mr. Roy.
Montreal, May 11.—A special session of the Criminal Court opened at St. Johns yesterday, with Mr. Justice Monnet presiding. The grand jury returned a true bill against Mr. P. H. Roy, late president of the Bank of St. Johns, on a charge of making false returns to the Government. The case was adjourned until today.

Blythe Must Hang.
Ottawa, May 11.—The cabinet-in-council had under consideration again yesterday the capital case of Walter Blythe, the Agincourt section man under sentence to be hanged on Thursday next for killing his wife through beating her with a poker while in a rage. It was decided to let the law take its course.

Sealer's Long Voyage.
Halifax, N.S., May 11.—The sealer Beatrice L. Corkum returned to port yesterday with 1,200 skins, after an absence of nearly nine months, during which time the schooner touched at Brazilian and South African ports.

Test Vote on Tariff.
Washington, D.C., May 11.—On practically a test vote in the Senate yesterday an amendment fixing the duty on pig-lead at 17-3 cents instead of 21-3 cents, as fixed by the committee on finance, was lost by 35 to 44.

Station Agent's Theft.
Regina, Sask., May 11.—For theft from trunks in his care as C.P.R. station agent at Heward, John Peebles has been sentenced to six months in jail. His wife is charged as his accomplice.

New Hospital Superintendent.
Brockville, May 11.—Miss Blanche Easton, one of Brockville's trained nurses, has gone to Port Arthur to take charge of the Railway and Marine Hospital of that town.

Evidence was also given that there was a conspiracy to compromise policemen specially charged by the chief with watching places for Sunday selling by bribing them not to report, and then placing the evidence before the chief.

License Is Renewed.
Albany, N.Y., May 11.—Having complied with the provisions of the insurance law limiting the amount of money which an insurance company may expend annually for new business, the Columbian National Life Insurance Co. of Boston, Mass., has been granted a license, which was refused when the returns of 1907 showed this section violated. In the meantime an injunction has restrained the state from excluding the company.

Will Stand For Rights.
Toronto, May 11.—Notwithstanding the passage of the Ontario & Michigan Power Bill in an amended form at Ottawa last week, Sir James Whitney will not relinquish the fight for provincial rights.
