

# Flesherton Happenings

**WILLIAM MOORE DEAD.**  
Another of the oldest members of the community has passed away in the person of Mr. William Moore who died on Tuesday night of last week at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. W. C. Parker, on the west back line. The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon to the public cemetery here, service being conducted by Rev. Dr. Caldwell, pastor of the Methodist church. The deceased was born at Redhill, County Cavan, Ireland, on March 17, 1820, and was therefore in his 90th year. In 1857 he was married in Ireland to Miss Sophia Humphrey, of Bellahais, County Cavan, who survives him. In 1879 he came with his family to Canada and after living a year in Toronto, settled in Artemesia, on the Durham Road. About six years ago he retired in this village. Besides his widow, three sons and six daughters survive as follows: Mrs. Alex. Henry Sunderland; William H., Toronto; Mrs. Ellen Parker, near Flesherton; Mrs. Sarah Crandell, Port Perry; Alexander, Cheltenham; Miss Sophia and Mrs. W. I. Richardson, Buffalo, Albert, Silver Creek, N.Y.; and Mrs. Alex. Norrie, Erin. Thomas died at Silver Creek five years ago and the remains were brought here for burial. Those of the family present from a distance were William and wife, Alex., Mrs. Richardson and Miss Sophia. Mrs. Norrie did not reach here till Saturday.

**MRS. MCKEE, SR.**  
After an illness of two weeks with congestion of the lungs, Mrs. McKee, sr., a very highly esteemed old lady, who had been a resident of Artemesia for 48 years, passed away on Saturday morning last at the home of her son, Mr. John McKee, west back line, from where the funeral took place on Monday to the Orange Valley cemetery. Funeral service was conducted at the house by the deceased's pastor, Rev. G. C. Little, of this place. Mrs. McKee was one of the oldest members of Chalmers Church here and was a fine old christian lady, who loved the service of the sanctuary and was faithful in her attendance while strength permitted. The deceased, who had reached the ripe age of 89 years, was born in the County Antrim, Ireland, from where she came to the United States in 1851, and lived in New York till 1867, when she came to Artemesia and settled with her son who survives her on the farm on which she died.

**MRS. ALLEN, SR.**  
After an illness of long duration, borne with christian resignation, there has passed away another old resident of Artemesia, in the person of Mrs. Ellen Allen, widow of the late Mr. James Allen, who died on Saturday last at the home of her son Richard on the east back line, from where the funeral took place to the public cemetery here on Sunday afternoon service being conducted at the house by the deceased's pastor, Rev. L. F. Kipp. Mrs. Allen, who was a consistent member of the Baptist Church for about 35 years, was an amiable and kind-hearted woman, held in high esteem in the community. The deceased, whose maiden name was Ellen Golland, was born at Grand River, Haldimand County, 72 years ago. At 17 years of age she came with her parents to Artemesia and three years later was married to her late husband, who died nine and a half years ago. The following grown up family survive: George and James Edward, in the United States; William H. and Misses Elizabeth and Ellen, in Toronto; Mrs. Wm. Wyatt, east back line, and Richard, on the homestead.
