**EUPHRASIA COUNCIL**

Court of Revision Held and Other Business Transacted.

The Council met on Wednesday, the 26th May, and formed a Court of Revision, Mr. Rennie in the chair.

The following action was taken in reference to appeals made against the assessment, and also in reference to changes required and necessary to be made in the Assessment Roll: The assessment of Richard Lanktree reduced \$200; Fred Brew assessed as M.F.; the assessment of Mrs. Orr on Fairmount lot reduced \$25; the assessment of Mrs. Orr's mill property confirmed; the assessment of Andrew Shaw reduced \$400; the S.E. 1/4 of lot 23 in the 2nd con. assessed to Wm. Kerr at a valuation of \$1000 on land and \$150 on buildings, the same taken from the assessment of Chas. Wilkinson; the assessment of Fred Kellough reduced \$200; W. L. Young assessed jointly with P. McCullough; Henry Bath assessed jointly with Wm. Bath; Jas. Baskin assessed jointly with Robert Baskin; the assessment of Geo. Yeardell confirmed.

Ellis—Murry—That the taxes charged against Mrs. Pentland, Mrs. Wilson and the Walters Falls show ground be struck from the roll.—Carried.

The Court adjourned until 10 o'clock June 11.

The Council resumed at 10 o'clock p.m. for the despatch of general township business. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Murry—Rennie—That the Commissioner of each division have the power to hire the stone crusher and grader to responsible parties, providing they pay \$5.00 per day for crusher and \$2.00 per day for grader, the commissioners to have control of running and moving crusher.—Carried.

Hutchinson—Johnston—That the Reeve and Treasurer be authorized to borrow money to pay all teachers' salaries for the first six months of 1909.—Carried.

Rennie—Hutchinson—That Wm. Walter be employed to run grader in the easterly part of the township and that he receive the sum of \$2.00 for day of ten hours.—Carried.

Rennie—Murry—That each Commissioner be granted the sum of \$400 to expend in their divisions on roads and bridges, the reeve to be consulted on all bridges.—Carried.

Rennie—Johnston—That the reeve and Mr. Hutchinson be a committee to investigate the bridge on 24 and 25 sideroad, con. 4, as reported by Robert Orr.—Carried.

Johnston—Murry—That the Reeve, Mr. Rennie and the Clerk be a committee on the 1909 roll.—Carried.

Hutchinson—Murry—That this council give a special grant of \$50 for the purpose of putting in tyle in the ditches opposite the business places in Kimberley.—Carried.

By-law No. 150, appointing Pathmasters, Poundkeepers and Fenceviewers was passed.

The following accounts were paid: Wm. McClung, for putting in culvert at lot 10, con. 4, \$3.75; Albert Ellis, for drawing tyle, \$2.00; Geo. Hutchinson, half day work on culvert on 24 and 25 sideroad \$1.00; A. L. Walker, for 616 feet cedar, \$9.00; Ed. Bradey, for repairing bridge on 3 and 4 sideroad, \$4.75; Robt. Johnston, for four days' commission work, \$8.00; J. R. Pawcett, part salary as assessor,
