And Court of Revision—No appeals Against Assessment.

The Council of Osprey met as a Court of Revision on Tuesday May 25, at Maxwell. The members were all present, and having severally made and subscribed to the statutory oath before the Clerk proceeded with the business of the Court. There were no appeals against the assessment.

Taylor—Buie—That the assessments placed against ministers' residences and Orange halls, be struck from the column for general rates and placed in the column for assessment liable for local improvements rates only.

Buie—Taylor—That the assessment charged against Joseph Ferguson on lot 2 Wellington street, Feversham, as a business tax, be struck off, as Mr. Ferguson is giving up business.

A number of names were added to the Assessment Roll and the Clerk instructed to make the additions and alterations therein, which completed the business of the Court.

Ryckman, \$3.50, account; Sawyer & Massey, \$15.25, account.

Taylor—Thompson—That the clerk notify the County Treasurer to receive the taxes charged as arrears against lot pt. 15, con. 9, less \$6.86 being amount charged in error for statute labor in the years 1906-7-8.—Carried.

TWO ECLIPSES

Moon and Sun Will Be In Eclipse During June.

Washington, May 31.—Two interesting spectacles in the astronomical world will occur during the coming month. These events will be eclipses of the moon and sun, the former on June 3, and the latter on June 17. The moon will rise totally eclipsed, and its totality will last about an hour; while the sun will only be in totality near the North Pole. Of chief interest will be the lunar eclipse, which will be visible over about half the earth. Only a few white men, namely Commander Robert E. Peary and his crew, who are now on an Arctic expedition, and, perhaps, a few whalers will have an opportunity of observing at totality the eclipse of the sun. While this eclipse will be visible in its partial eclipse, the region near the North Pole is the only part of the globe where it will be seen as a total eclipse.

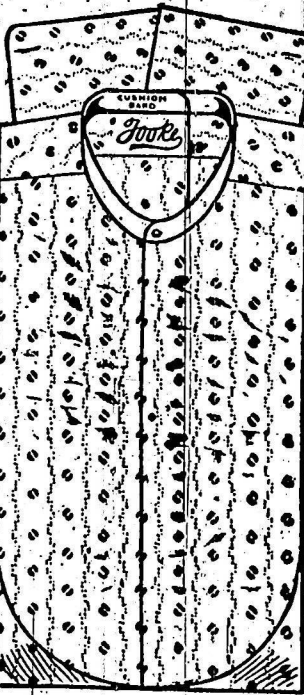
