"QUEEN OF THE INLAND SEAS"

New Steamer Hamonic Makes An Auspicious Trial Trip from Collingwood to Sarnia.

Collingwood dispatch.—Carrying a full complement of passengers, the new steamer Hamonic of the Northern Navigation Company made her trial trip on Saturday and Sunday.

Already they call the new visitor to lake ports "the Queen of the Inland Seas," and apparently with good reason. The reputation of some of the large passenger boats plying between United States ports has been deservedly high, but the Hamonic equals their capacity and excels them all in the beauty, harmony and luxury of her interior arrangements. All the conveniences of the most perfectly appointed homes and the best ideas in the construction of all the latest transatlantic liners have been adopted in fitting up and finishing the ship. When by her performance Saturday and Sunday she showed herself, in addition to these things, to be a marvel of steady locomotion, the title "Queen of the Inland Seas" seems none too good for her.

Rarely has a trip been made under more favorable auspices, the Grand Trunk Railway, the Northern Navigation Company, and Old Probs. combining to make the occasion memorable. A party of ladies and gentlemen from Ontario and Quebec were taken on Saturday morning by special Grand Trunk train from Toronto to Collingwood, where they immediately embarked on the gaily decorated ship and steamed for Sarnia. A call at Owen Sound being the only interruption in the voyage. Sarnia was reached early Sunday afternoon, and again the special train was awaiting the party on a notably fast run to Toronto, stops being made only at London, Woodstock, Brantford and Hamilton to accommodate passengers for these points.

A CANADIAN BUILT BOAT.

The Hamonic from Keel to trucks is a Canadian product, having been built at the Collingwood shipbuilding yards. The feeling of national pride to which this must appeal is justified in the knowledge that the result is the last word in shipbuilding for the lakes.

Experts on boat-building admired the fine lines of the ship, but it was the magnificent interior fittings which appealed most strongly to most of the passengers, particularly the ladies. Some of the dimensions of the boat are:

Length, 365 feet.
Beam, 50 feet.
Tonnage, gross, 5,240.
Horse power, 7,000.
Passenger capacity, 400 firstclass.
Passenger capacity, 75 secondclass.
Package freight, 3,500 tons.
Weight of steel used in building, 2,000 tons.
Weight of completed vessel, 4,000 tons.

Collingwood Shipbuilding yards have turned out twenty-two ships in five years.
