## SAD DEATH OF CHESTER DISBROW

### Came With Parents to Visit Markdale Friends When He Took Ill and Died.

Chester Disbrow, aged 14 years, only son of Mr. and Mrs. John O. Disbrow, of South Norwalk, Conn., who with his parents arrived two weeks ago and were the guests of Mrs. George Walker, "Carty Villa", was taken ill the 1st July. Drs. Sprone and Mayo were in almost constant attendance and everything that could be done during his short illness was done to save the bright and promising young life, but to no avail, as he succumbed early Monday morning, the 5th, to the fatal malady, peritonitis. Chester was a boy of superior mental endowments, manly deportment, and had become a general favorite with his associates here. His premature death is a crushing blow to his fond parents. Rev. Mr. Dymond visited him frequently during his short illness and was deeply affected by the sad event. On Tuesday morning the grief-stricken parents left for their home with the mortal remains of their boy, and interment will take place in the family plot, Newark, on Thursday. 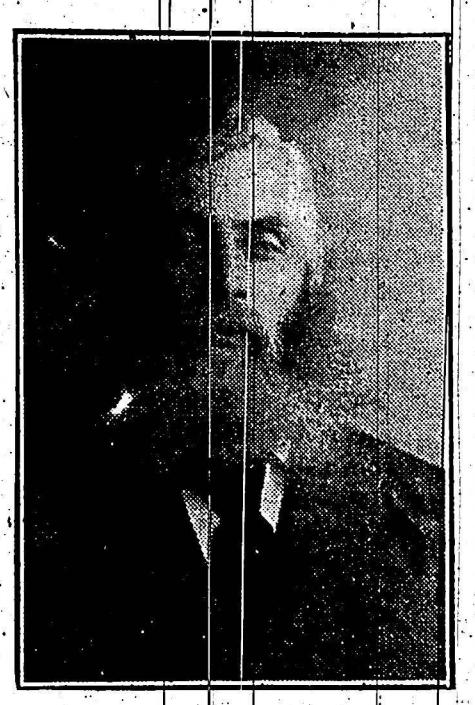

### Fell Prey to Flames Early Wednesday Morning—Loss Nearly \$3,000—No Insurance.
