COUNTY COUNCIL'S CLOSING SESSIONS

The County Council closed its June session on Saturday forenoon and by one of its last enactments expressed itself as of the opinion that skim milk was good enough for inmates of the house of refuge and the statement was made that many of the farmers of the county and some even of the members themselves used separated milk on their porridge. The matter came up in connection with a motion by Dr. Hershley that the inmates of the house of refuge should not be supplied with a poorer quality of milk than was required by the boards of health, and that the manager be instructed to supply them with whole milk. The motion was voted down after the argument had been advanced that the cream was needed to make butter for the institution and that if they drank the cream with their milk they could not have butter on their bread. One member remarked that the County of Grey was going on record as a skim milk council.

The urban municipalities of the County owe it to Dr. Mearns, of Hanover, that they receive back \$1,368.70, which was wrongfully levied upon them for school purposes during the last three years. This levy should have been made only upon the rural municipalities, and the error was discovered by Dr. Mearns last year. A by-law was passed at this session to levy the amount upon the rural municipalities and refund it to the urban ones. Owen Sound's share is \$797.75 and Hanover's share \$570.35.

Six meetings were held in all during the session, three of which were dealt with in our last issue. The chief documents presented at the Thursday meeting were the presentation of the Grand Trunk at the General Sessions, claims from Dundalk and Normanby for \$80.69 and \$17.75 respectively as refunds of expenses for inmates and an application for grant of \$200 for the Children's Aid Society.

A report from the Finance Committee recommended among other things that no action be taken in the matter of supplying county constables with handcuffs; that the matter of a grant to Strathcona Hospital, Mount Forest, be laid over till next session; that Owen Sound hospital be granted \$1000 on condition that it receive inmates of the house of refuge who need hospital treatment free of charge; that each of the county agricultural Societies be granted \$200 and each of the Farmers Institutes \$25; that application of the Walters Falls Agricultural Society to be placed on the same footing as other societies and to share in grants be granted; that \$250 of a grant be made to the 1st Regiment. These recommendations were adopted.

A recommendation of the County Property Committee that the matter of improvements in and around the court house as suggested by the presentation of the Grand Jury be left with Chairman McClelland to do what work he considers necessary, was adopted.

By report of Finance the application of the Owen Sound Horticultural Society for a grant was laid over and no grant made, but \$50 was voted to the Salvation Army rescue work.

Report of Education recommended that claims for maintenance be paid as follows: Warton High School, \$38.44; Mount Forest high school \$48.10; Chesley high school \$262.21; also that the Warden, Dr. Hershley and Dr. Mearns be a committee to meet the public school inspectors (travelling expenses as referred to in the Warden's address) Adopted.

The Communications and Memorials Committee recommended that no action be taken on the matter of appointment of a drainage inspector advanced by the Kent County Council; that the communication of A. D. Creasor, police magistrate of Owen Sound, re enlarged jurisdiction, be referred back for further information at the November sessions; that the Warden and Dr. Mearns be delegates to the convention for the betterment of consumptives at Toronto in September. Adopted.

A by-law was passed enacting that bridges for which the County is responsible on township and county lines must have a span of ten feet or over and approaches not exceeding 100 feet.

At the Friday afternoon meeting reports were presented from Finance, Road and Bridge, County Property, Education and Communications and Memorials.

By-law 740, the one to levy a rate to meet the current expenditure and liabilities of the County for 1910 was passed at this meeting. The amount to be provided for was \$49,194.15 and the total rateable property of the County is \$32,796,300. A rate of 1 1/2 mills on the dollar will be levied to raise the amount.

On motion of Messrs. Legate and Wilson, a special grant of \$200 was made to Hanover on condition that Bruce made a similar grant to assist in constructing a bridge on the street connecting the County line on the limits of Hanover.

On behalf of the members who visited Meaford on Wednesday, a vote of thanks was passed to Mayor Horsley for the entertainment he furnished them and the clerk was instructed to forward Mr. Horsley a copy of the resolution.

A vote of thanks was also passed to Dr. Sproule, M.P., and W. S. Middlebro, M.P., for coming from Ottawa to assist the deputation which waited on the Ontario Legislature in reference to assistance for the Meaford Railway.

The Saturday meeting started at 9 a.m. Several communications and accounts were presented in respect to which Mr. Legate said the rule of council which required all accounts to be in early in the session or they would be laid over, should be enforced. This move was favored and the accounts will remain unpaid until November.

The Centre Grey Women's Institute wrote, not for the purpose of expressing thanks for grant of \$10, but to ask for a larger sum.

Mayor Horsley wrote expressing his gratification at the visit to Meaford on Wednesday and inviting the council to hold its November session there.

Report of House of Refuge Committee stated that the members had visited Markdale on Thursday and recommended that four acres of the house of refuge farm be sold to that corporation for waterworks purposes at \$70 per acre; that all expenses of transfer be paid by Markdale; that all timber of any value be reserved by the County and a year given for removal of same; that the expenses of the three delegates (\$1.50 each) be paid.

In committee on the report, Mr. Legate moved that it be \$75 per acre, which he considered very cheap, considering the purpose it was required for.

Mr. Garvie moved that it be \$100 per acre.

Mr. McFarland had a suspicion of threat in his voice when he said that when he proposed to pay \$50 an acre he was mentioning a figure three times the value of the land. Markdale would arbitrate rather than pay an exorbitant price.

Mr. Smith, chairman of the committee, held that the county should deal liberally with Markdale as a part of itself. To this Mr. Legate replied that the county had not been dealt honestly with by Markdale. He also referred to the high values placed on water privileges which Owen Sound required for waterworks extensions.

The Warden held that this land was worth \$100 to Markdale as a water privilege, and Mr. McClelland reminded the members that it was a water privilege that Markdale wanted and not land.

Mr. Legate's amendment that it be \$75 an acre was carried. A clause was added to the report instructing the county officials, when conveying the land to see that all precautions were taken to guard the interests of the county.

It was in considering this report that Dr. Hershley moved that the manager of the house of refuge be instructed to give the inmates of the house of refuge unskimmed milk. Warden Agnew defended the management very warmly, declaring that he had dropped in at unexpected times and found everything very satisfactory. There was harmony between the manager and inmates and he would not see Mr. Hershley antagonized again. As a better milk he intimated that he was more accustomed himself to use of skimmed than unskimmed milk.

Mr. Smith had no objection to giving them whole milk, but if this were done they would feed more cows.

Mr. Hastie suggested putting a Babcock tester to see that the milk was up to quality.

Dr. Hershley's motion was voted down which Mr. Legate declared was a disgrace to the county.

Reports of Finance, County Property, Roads and Bridges, and Education, all of minor importance, were presented and adopted.

Resolution of condolence was passed expressing sympathy with the late Mr. F. Fulford and family on the loss in the death of his son, which was deepened by its having occurred when far from home.

Dr. Mearns moved that the next session be held at Hanover, commencing on Monday, 22nd of November.

Mr. Christie moved in amendment that the session be held in Owen Sound. The Hanover motion had a strong support, but the majority was in favor of Owen Sound.
