

NEW ANGLICAN HYMN-BOOK

The following is a circular re the new Church of England Hymn Book:

To the Clergy of the Diocese of Huron:—As announced in the Synod the Depository is prepared to help in the introduction of the new Hymn Book. The Depository is prepared to supply all the editions ordinarily required for use in congregations both with and without music and in combination with the Prayer Book, as nearly as possible at cost price.

After consultation with the Bishop, the following method of procedure is recommended: Every clergyman is advised to send an Order-slip to every family in the parish, with a request that the head of the family, or some other person fill in, under the proper headings, the number and the kind of editions required by the family, and return the Order-slip to the Clergyman, together with the money to pay for the books.

The Clergy are reminded of the Bishop's suggestion in his Charge that every family should possess a copy of the Hymn Book with music. By far the best edition for family purposes is the \$1.10 edition, and it is suggested that the Clergy inform their people to that effect. The Clergy should distribute the Order-slips at once and ask to have them returned to them before August 10. Then the Clergyman will add up under each heading the total ordered by his people, and enter these totals in a separate Order-slip and send it in to the Synod office (together with money order or cheque to pay for all the books required) before August 15. As the Depository is providing the books at cost, cash must accompany every Order-slip sent to the Synod office. No order will be attended to unless accompanied by cash. The Clergy ought therefore to insist on the rule that cash must accompany every Order-slip returned to them by their parishioners.

The Clergyman will keep the Order-slips received from his people so that he may know exactly the number of books ordered by each family. On receipt of the books the Clergyman should announce in the church or through the press or both, that the books are ready for distribution and should name a place where they may be obtained. Efforts should be made to distribute the books quickly, so that the use of them in the Church may be begun without delay.

Of course the Clergy will attend to all this either personally or through some parochial organization, preferably the former. The Clergy should take care to send their Order-slips with cash to the Synod office before August 15. Orders received after that date will have to wait until the order in hand have been supplied. This rule will be strictly adhered to.

The Depository is also prepared to supply the Hymn Book in a variety of styles and bindings, at prices varying from those indicated in the Order-slip up to \$3.00.

N.B.—The freight on all orders of Ten Dollars and over will be paid by the Depository; the freight on all orders under Ten Dollars must be paid by the person ordering, C. O. D.

All orders should be addressed to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Synod.

The Great Muskoka Excursion

There is every indication that a large number of our citizens will take advantage of the great four-day outing to the world-famed Muskoka Lakes, which will go over the C.P.R. on Saturday, July 31. The excursion, which is being run by "The Sun" Press Club, of Owen Sound, presents the greatest holiday opportunity of the season—the rare chance of seeing the Muskoka Lakes, the Killarney of America—at exceptionally low cost. The rate from Markdale is \$2.20 return. The excursion goes over C.P.R. to Bala, where the train will be met by steamers of the Muskoka Navigation Company. A complete round trip of the Lakes, including Lake Rosseau, Lake Joseph and Lake Muskoka, besides a trip up the Muskoka River to Bracebridge on these steamers may be had for \$1.00 extra. Excursionists from Markdale will leave by regular train, leaving Markdale at 7.44 a.m., and connecting at Bolton with the fast through train from Owen Sound. Circulars regarding the trip were distributed about the village on Saturday. Anyone who did not get a copy may secure one by dropping a post card to "The Sun," Owen Sound. The rate from other nearby stations is: Holland Centre \$2.35; Berkeley \$2.30; Flesherton \$2.10. Tickets from points (Owen Sound to Markdale good for four days. Tickets from Flesherton and points south, three days only.

Christ Church

The Apostolic Rite of Confirmation was administered by the Right Rev. David Williams, D.D., Bishop of Huron, to fifteen candidates last Monday evening. The service commenced with the singing of "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," and then there followed a portion of evening-song, Psalms 21 and 121 being used as specially appropriate for the occasion. Then was sung "Fight the good fight with all thy might," after which the Bishop delivered a helpful and instructive sermon from Acts 11: 26. "The disciples were called Christians first at Antioch." Just before the "Laying on of Hands" one of the Confirmation hymns invoking the gift of the Holy Ghost, was sung, and then the candidates were presented two by two to the Bishop. At the conclusion of the Rite, there followed the hymn "Thine Forever God of Love," and then His Lordship presented the candidates with their Confirmation certificates, at the same time shaking hands with them and welcoming them to the full membership of the Church. The service closed with prayer and the benediction by the Bishop. There was a very large congregation present and the service was bright and impressive throughout. The special offerings of the candidates are devoted to the building of new churches. Something over \$400 is raised annually throughout the Diocese by this means.

Eight of our Proton boys spent an evening with the Swinton Park youths last week and report "just a dandy time." The boys hope to entertain the Swintonites also in the near future.

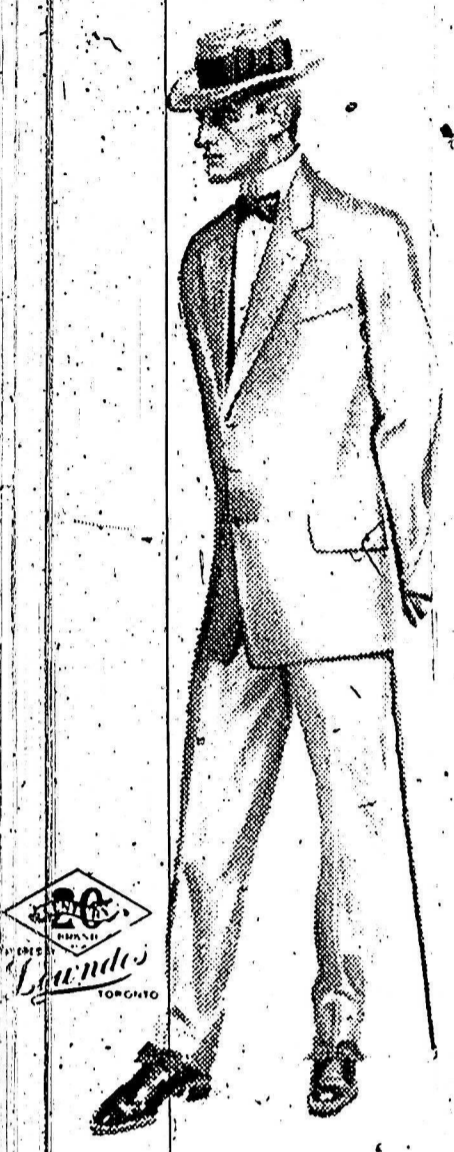
