STOPPED ON THE WAY.

A clever seizure of liquor intended
for Owen Sound was that made a
few days ago by License Inspector
Beckett. The inspector stopped T.
Porter, who was driving from Meaford
to Owen Sound, and found that
his buggy contained a receptacle
2 1/2 inches long, 17 inches wide
and seven inches deep. This was
filled with liquor, the sale of which
is unlawful in Owen Sound. Under
the amendment to the Liquor Li-
cense Law made last session, the
whiskey was seized and confiscated
by the orders of Magistrate Ruther-
ford, before whom Porter was
tried. Porter pleaded that he was
instructed to receive the vessel, of
whose contents he was ignorant,
and deliver it.

CHICAGO'S EXPERIENCE.

"Ninety-five per cent. of the
trouble in the police department,
and at least ninety-eight per cent.
of the discharges in the fire depart-
ment of Chicago are due to the
use of intoxicants," declared How-
ard O. Sprone, Attorney for the
Civil Service Commission in his
annual report made public July
17th. "The head of the police de-
partment filed last year the largest
number of charges against mem-
bers of his department, ag-
gregating 286 for the year. "Nearly
all the delinquencies of employees
against whom charges were filed
are traceable to drink. This
statement will apply, it is believed,
to similar departments in all the
large cities of the country."

The daily press correspondents
appear to have a standing "assign-
ment" to report every instance
where an alleged prohibition city
raises its taxes or gets into finan-
cial difficulty. Why, then, should
not these same scribes take equal
pains to report similar facts from
wide-open towns which go "broke,"
despite all their license fees. Rock
Island, Illinois, we are now inform-
ed, with a population of 27,000,
and 103 saloons, has just added
half a cent to its taxes with which
