THE EAST VS. THE WEST

 Sir—By the kindness of a friend I read in a local paper not long ago the opposing views of two former residents of Artemesia on the merits and demerits of this Western climate. It is just possible that they are both right from their own standpoint and experience. One of them is not very young; his blood does not course so strongly as it used to; he finds the 'weather too frigid. The other can ride twenty miles, and not feel the cold more than he did in Ontario, though it is 40 below zero. But he is young and strong and chuckles over the fact that he has property worth \$3000 to \$4000 as the result of his western venture. The first one has made the pot boil better than it used to do, but, as the earthquake disturbs his solitary repose he seems to ask in effect if life is worth living. If a man has a pinching shoe to wear he will find it as inconvenient in Saskatchewan as in Ontario. A good average crop, with prices soaring, or keeping the present high level are in prospect. I heard recently of a tenderfoot from Artemesia who went to look up a homestead and pre-emption and was a little discouraged by initial difficulties. Let him screw his courage up to the sticking place and doggedly persist and he will come out all right in the West, but this is also true in Ontario. Not so much where as what we are solves the problem of success. Whether young or old let us not forget it. Not a few men look forward to the time when they can go back to Ontario to spend at least the evening of life. One young man here has between 500 and 600 acres worth perhaps \$30 per acre. He has visions of a nicely fixed 100 acres near a large town. Thinks it would spell more comfort, but not more money, than his present holding, and no doubt he is right.
