Hon. Dr. Pugsley, home from the West, says that improved crop conditions that are largely due to farming knowledge of American settlers.

Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce F.C.T. O'Hara returns from England with the report that the Motherland's business men are just awakening to Canadian opportunities.

C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture of Canada, has gone to England to start negotiations looking to the solution of the problem of getting domestic servants for homes in the Province of Ontario.

He hopes to induce enough servants to emigrate from England to supply the need. Commenting on his visit, "The London Telegraph" says: "It is probable that there is no part of the British Empire in which there are at the present moment better or more profitable openings than there are in Ontario for three classes of immigrants: farmers possessed of some small capital, farm laborers and domestic servants."

It will not be long till the time of the fall fairs. At the present time in Ontario these organizations depend almost entirely upon the support given them by the farmers. It was said the other day that in some districts around here much excellent stock and produce was never shown at all, because the owners did not care to take them to the show grounds. If such an attitude were generally adopted, the fall fairs would soon be things of the past, and their educative value lost. If a farmer has something which he thinks is just as good or better than he had before it is worth his while going to a little trouble with this fall show business. Every exhibit helps the fair, and when the fair is helped the agricultural community is helped.

By-Law No. 204 Of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUE OF DEBENTURES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE VILLAGE OF MARKDALE FOR THE PURPOSES HERETOFORE MENTIONED.

Whereas the municipal corporation of the Village of Markdale have decided to acquire sufficient land for a fire hall and to purchase or erect a building suitable for a Fire Hall and to purchase hose reels and other fire protection appliances for the said corporation, it has become necessary to raise by way of loan on the credit of the said municipality the sum of \$3,000 and to provide \$3,000 for the cost of the said Fire Hall hose reels and other fire protection appliances and to provide for the expenses and discount and other charges negotiating the said loan. The cost of all of which has been estimated at \$3,000, and to carry into effect the said recited objects, it will be necessary to raise by way of loan the sum of \$3,000 in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And Whereas the amount of the debt to be created by this by-law is \$3,000 and the purpose for which it is created is to carry into effect the said objects, above recited and described and in order that it will be necessary to raise by way of loan the sum of \$3,000 as herein provided, the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to other purposes as may be deemed expedient.

And Whereas it is expedient to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums during the period of ten years, being the current term of the said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in any of the other nine years of said period.

And Whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the Village of Markdale according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, being that prepared for the year 1909, is the sum of \$13,563.00 of which no part is exempt from taxation.

And Whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said municipality is \$33,267.82 of which no part of principal or interest is in arrear.

And Whereas the total amount required by the Municipal Act to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as herein provided is \$379.14.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the village of Markdale enacts as follows:

1. The Municipal Council of the said Village of Markdale shall expend the sum of \$3,000 in purchasing or erecting a Fire Hall and in purchasing Hose Reels and other fire protection appliances for the said corporation; and the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said village to the amount of \$3,000 as aforesaid in sums of not less than \$100 each shall be issued on the first day of October, A.D., 1909, date at which debentures shall be dated, and the date of issue thereof shall be payable within ten years thereafter, namely on the 15th day of December, A.D., 1919, at the Treasurer's office in the said Village of Markdale.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Village of Markdale or by some other person or persons authorized by by-law to sign the same and the Clerk shall affix thereto the corporate seal of the municipality.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum payable yearly at the said Treasurer's office on the Fifteenth day of December in each and every year during the currency thereof and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest which coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Village of Markdale.

4. During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the Village of Markdale the sum of \$379.14 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt as shown in schedule A, hereto annexed.

5. This By-Law shall take effect

on the day of the passing thereof. 6. The votes of the electors of the said Village of Markdale shall be taken on this by-law at the following times and places, on Monday, the 20th day of September, 1909, commencing at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and continuing until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the said day by the following Deputy Returning Officer, Thos. Mathews, and Wm. Flesher, Poll Clerk, in the Council Chamber, Haskett's Hall.

7. On Monday, the 14th day of September, A.D., 1909, the Rates of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at the council chamber at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to appoint persons to attend at the polling place aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this by-law.

8. The Clerk of the Council of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at his office in the Town Hall at ten o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, the 22nd day of September, 1909, to sum up the number of votes for and against the by-law.
