DUNDALK

Mr. William Armour, who has been visiting at the old homestead at Badjeros during the past six weeks, returned to his home at Wiarton on Saturday, taking the train at Dundalk.

It isn't very many of his years who can boast of having assisted in the present harvest.

A party of seven government survey men arrived in town Monday and are encamped in three or four tents on John Ludlow's property near the railway.

They are under Chief Surveyor Neelands and their work is taking levels along the railway for scientific purposes for the government.

The work has been going on for some time and this party have been over other branches of railway.

They are making their way north on this line and will be here for about a week working on both sides of the village.

They will find they are right on the top of the peak at this point. The altitude above sea level here enables Dundalk citizens to look down on all surrounding towns.

The drill at the electric light plant has ceased work after making about 70 feet in the rock.

The council think that with proper pumping outfit instead of the ordinary injector a sufficient supply of water may now be procured for the boiler.

As to the electric light, local consumers should not have it in their heads that they are paying too much.

Dundalk rates at present are fully as low as some water powers offer, and below what the majority of steam plants charge.

Enquiry at Grand Valley shows a flat rate of two cents per 16 candle power light per night or 60 cents per month.

This is a steam power plant, one of the best in the country and supplies both Grand Valley and Arthur.

The Markdale rates from water power are similar to Dundalk. They have a more reliable system, of course, but their rates are not lower generally.

Glepec is another village which was lighted by a steam plant under private ownership. Their flat rate was 60 cents per month up to a short time ago.

They are now installing a municipal plant at an expenditure of from \$12,000 to \$15,000 but we venture to say their rates will not be lower than Dundalk.—Herald.
