## GOVERNMENT VISITS NORTH

(Continued from Page 3)

Ontario for. Wednesday, Sept. 8, 1909, the government excursionists dined on the products of the Temiskaming district, these being the gift of the New Liskeard Board of Trade. Moreover they opened the Fall Fair at Englehart, twenty-five miles north of New Liskeard, on their way down to the latter town; and this was the first fair there.

### THE DIVISIONAL POINT.

Englehart is a good sized town, having advanced from the clap-board to the tin sheathed stage, which is the third degree from the tar paper or log phase of existence. It is the divisional point on the T. & N.O. between North Bay and Cochrane and supplied a crowd of three or four hundred for the fair opening.

Oats, barley, wheat, flax, timothy, vetches, and grass--field grass six feet high--and turnips, beets, carrots, and onions, all of good quality, were shown, besides poultry and cows and horses. But THE exhibit was the babies, and they got on the programme in this wise:

Hon. Frank Cochrane had said the preliminaries and the crowd was bunched around the speakers at the one end of the grounds when Dr. Godfrey, who couldn't see the speech-makers for the crowd nor hear them for the cows, sang out: "Here's where Colonel Matheson judges the babies!"

There was a commotion and the blushing bachelor guardian of the Provincial Treasury was immediately surrounded by hopeful parents and babies who gurgled, giggled, wailed, crawled, wept and cooed. Meanwhile the speaker of the day went on speaking--to a diminished audience. The Colonel blushed up to the roots of his white hair and was in desperation about making a choice when Dr. Godfrey, the cause of the trouble, diplomatically suggested that as all the dozen babies each seemed the best, each should receive a first prize; so a dozen greenbacks were pulled off and stuffed into chubby little fists and twenty-four parents were the proudest people in the Temiskaming district.

From Englehart--where, among other industries, they have a hot-house to grow flowers for the section men's homes all along the T. & N.O.--the excursionists passed on down to New Liskeard. The programme called for a drive here through the agricultural district and a public meeting later, but darkness interfered with the first item.

Toronto, Sept. 11--Back from the wilds of the north, which on near view proved less wild than might be expected, came the Hon. Frank Cochrane's government inspection excursion this morning.

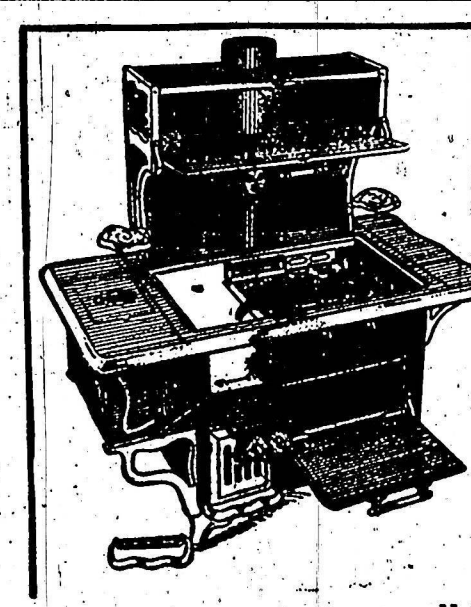
The party was away a week. They covered 1,100 miles by rail and water, and the trip, it is estimated, cost upwards of \$9,000. They had a good time and they learned a lot.

Above all, they learned that the northland wants things. Elk Lake wants the Montreal River made navigable, without portages and a railway; likewise a wagon road in a hurry, connecting them with the government railway. Latchford wants a smelter, and its assay office back; and so on all along the line, Cochrane, Haliburton, New Liskeard, Cobalt.

### WHAT THE COUNTRY WANTS.

In all these places the feeling was pretty clearly shown that the Government was finding New Ontario a goose that laid silver eggs, and the Government addressed urged not to starve the useful fowl to death. Lower rates on the Government railway, an extension of the service, wagon roads, and assistance in sanitation were the general demand.

It cannot be said that much was promised. At times the Hon. Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines very bluntly said he intended to take all out of New Ontario, he could get. Dennis Murphy, one of the T. & N.O. commissioners, was a little more diplomatic. He told the people at Elk Lake they might get a railway in there sooner than they expected. But no definite pledge of a new line was given. The Government railway will be extended sometime and somewhere.
