

By-Law No. 203

Of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUE OF DEBENTURES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE VILLAGE OF MARKDALE TO THE AMOUNT OF \$7,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSES THEREIN MENTIONED.

Whereas it has been decided to construct a system of waterworks, and By-Law No. 191 authorizing the same has been duly passed by the Council and received the assent and approval of the ratepayers entitled to vote thereon.

And Whereas debentures of the said Municipality for \$20,000 were as authorized by the said By-Law duly issued and disposed of.

And Whereas contracts for the installation of the said system of waterworks have been let and part of the work done, and it is now found that another sum of Seven Thousand Dollars is required in accordance with Engineer's Estimates to pay the balance of the cost of the works, plant, machinery and appliances necessary for the erection, installation and completion of the said system of waterworks, and it is necessary for said Council to raise by way of loan the said sum of Seven Thousand Dollars in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And Whereas the amount of the debt to be created by this By-Law is \$7,000.00, and the purposes for which it is created are to carry into effect the said objects above recited and described and in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said municipality for the sum of \$7,000.00, as herein provided, the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to no other.

And Whereas it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of thirty years, being the currency of said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts, that the aggregate amount payable in each year for the principal and interest, in respect of said debt, shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other 29 years of said period.

And Whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Village of Markdale according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, being that prepared for the year 1909, is the sum of \$313,563.00, of which no part is exempt from taxation.

And Whereas the amount of the existing debt of the said municipality is \$33,267.78, of which no part of principal or interest is in arrear.

And Whereas the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as herein provided is \$429.74.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the corporation of the Village of Markdale enacts as follows:

1. The Municipal Council of the said Village of Markdale shall expend the sum of \$7,000 in completing the said system of waterworks in and for the said corporation; and for the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said village to the amount of \$7,000 as aforesaid in sums of not less than \$100 each shall be issued on the first day of October, A.D., 1909, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of issue thereof and shall be payable within thirty years thereafter, namely on the Fifteenth day of December, A.D., 1939, at the Treasurer's office in the said village of Markdale.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer of the said Village or by some other person or persons authorized by-law to sign same, and the clerk shall attach thereto the corporate seal of the municipality.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum payable yearly at the said Treasurer's office on the Fifteenth day of December in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer of the said village of Markdale.

4. During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Village of Markdale the sum of \$429.74 for the purpose of pay-

ing the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt as shown in schedule A, hereto annexed.

5. This By-Law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof.

6. The votes of the electors of the said village of Markdale shall be taken by this By-Law at the following times and places, on Monday, the 20th day of September, 1909, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the said day by the following Deputy Returning Officer, Thomas Mathews, and William Fleisher, Poll Clerk, in the Council Chamber, Haskett's Hall.

7. On Monday, the 13th day of September, A.D., 1909, the Reeve of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at the Council Chamber at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-Law respectively.

8. The Clerk of the Council of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at his office in the Town Hall at ten o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday, the 21st day of September, 1909, to sum up the number of votes for and against the By-Law.

Perth Man's Back Pay for U. S. Pension.

A report from Perth under date of Oct. 8, said: Mr. Ed. Love has received papers from the pension department of the United States, and now proceedings are well under way for him to receive due recognition for the services he rendered to his country in 1864. Mr. Love was a soldier in the Unionist cause and saw active service, but after peace was proclaimed he came over to Canada and settled here, never paying any attention to what was his just due in the form of a pension. Some months ago, however, in conversation with a United States ex-soldier, who was receiving his pension, he was convinced that he too, was entitled to a pension and at once began proceedings to recover the same. It was a most difficult matter for Mr. Love to establish his claim, as every member of the company to which he belonged had passed away and he was just about giving up hope, when he learned that a lady, who when a girl, lived with his parents, was alive. He hunted her up and the rest was smooth sailing. He will receive about \$5,000 in cash, his pension from 1864 to the present time with interest compounded, and \$12 a month during his life-time.

By-Law No. 204

Of the Corporation of the Village of Markdale.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUE OF DEBENTURES FOR THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE VILLAGE OF MARKDALE TO THE AMOUNT OF \$3,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSES THEREIN MENTIONED.

Whereas the municipal corporation of the Village of Markdale have decided to acquire sufficient land for a fire hall and to purchase or erect a building suitable for a Fire Hall and to purchase a hose, reels and other fire protection appliances for the said corporation, it has become necessary to raise by way of loan on the credit of the said municipality the sum of \$3,000 and to provide \$3,000 for the cost of the said Fire Hall, hose, reels and other fire protection appliances and to provide for the expenses and discount and other charges negotiating the said loan. The cost of all of which has been estimated at \$3,000, and to carry into effect the said recited objects it will be necessary for the said council to raise by way of loan the said sum of \$3,000 in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And Whereas the amount of the debt to be created by this by-law is \$3,000 and the purposes for which it is created is to carry into effect the said objects above recited and described and in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said municipality for the sum of \$3,000 as herein provided, the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purposes aforesaid and to no other.

And Whereas it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of ten years, being the currency of said debentures, said yearly sums being of such respective amounts, that the aggregate amount payable in each year for the principal and interest, in respect of said debt, shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other nine years of said period.

And Whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Village of Markdale according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, being that prepared for the year 1909, is the sum of \$313,563.00, of which no part is exempt from taxation.

And Whereas the amount of the existing debt of the said municipality is \$33,267.78, of which no part of principal or interest is in arrear.

And Whereas the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as herein provided is \$379.14.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the corporation of the Village of Markdale enacts as follows:

1. The Municipal Council of the said Village of Markdale shall expend the sum of \$3,000 in purchasing or erecting a Fire Hall and in purchasing Hose, Reels and other fire protection appliances for the said corporation; and for the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said village to the amount of \$3,000 as aforesaid in sums of not less than \$100 each shall be issued on the first day of October, A.D., 1909, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of issue thereof and shall be payable within ten years thereafter, namely on the 15th day of December, A.D., 1919, at the Treasurer's office in the said Village of Markdale.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer of the said Village or by some other person or persons authorized by-law to sign same and the clerk shall attach thereto the corporate seal of the municipality.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum payable yearly at the said Treasurer's office on the Fifteenth day of December in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer of the said village of Markdale.

4. During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Village of Markdale the sum of \$379.14 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt as shown in schedule A, hereto annexed.

5. This By-Law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof.

6. The votes of the electors of the said village of Markdale shall be taken on this By-Law at the following times and places, on Monday, the 20th day of September, 1909, commencing at the hour of 9 o'clock in the forenoon and continuing until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the said day by the following Deputy Returning Officer, Thos. Mathews, and Wm. Fleisher, Poll Clerk, in the Council Chamber, Haskett's Hall.

7. On Monday, the 13th day of September, A.D., 1909, the Reeve of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at the council chamber at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to appoint persons to attend at the polling places aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this by-law respectively.

8. The Clerk of the Council of the said Village of Markdale shall attend at his office in the Town Hall at ten o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, the 22nd day of September, 1909, to sum up the number of votes for and against the by-law.

STUDY IN BLACK AND WHITE.
Every election dealing with the temperance issue adds a perceptible patch of white to the prohibition territory on those maps which tell the tale in black and white. This not only keeps the misapprehensions busy, but also demands the unremitting attention of those who are interested in the moral up-goings of the world. One must now be a specialist to keep track of the rapidly changing complication of those United States maps.

The world is being specially advised and convinced of the real meaning of the saloon. For instance the Detroit News, in emphasizing the saloon as a danger element in politics, says: "Michigan as a State has been inclined to be very liberal towards the saloon interest, but indulgence has been abused. The powers which have attempted to control local and State legislation and to override the statutes that exist find themselves pulled up with a sudden curb."

This comment was provoked by the recent local option victories in Michigan. This State has 83 counties, eleven of which went dry previously. Of the 28 that have just voted, 20 were added to prohibition territory. The total majority of the 20 counties was over 16,000 for abolition, while the majority for the traffic in the 8 remaining counties was about 7,000. One year ago Michigan had but one dry county; now, as stated above, it has 31.

State-wide prohibition prevails in 9 states, 6 of this number have swung into line within the last two years.

Arkansas and Florida have practically realized this aim, bills for submission having passed their respective legislatures.

Colorado enjoys an anomaly in temperance history. It has 50 prohibition cities and towns situated in wet counties.

In Connecticut two-thirds of the territory and two-fifths of the population are under prohibition.

Delaware has three-fourths of its area under prohibition.

Illinois' local option law passed in 1907, has already closed 1,600 saloons, while in the city of Chicago one-half of the area, containing one-fourth of the population has gone dry.

More than two-thirds of the population of Indiana live in dry territory. Six out of ten largest cities under prohibition in the United States are situated in Massachusetts. More than one-half of Minnesota's population are under no-license. Three-fifths of the area of Ne-
