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FIERCE BATTLE WITH DESPERADO

Fight on Orangeville Street in which Notorious Character Wounded Constable and Escaped.

Orangeville, Ont., Oct. 31—Bob Cook, the notorious local desperado, thrice a jail-breaker, the last time at Boise City, Idaho, where he also freed a number of prisoners, and who has successfully resisted arrest at the hands of the local police on several occasions, was last night engaged in another fight with the authorities, and as a result Constable James Halbert is seriously wounded. Cook, as usual, made his escape.

After an absence of between two and three years, Cook yesterday revisited his home town. He arrived on the morning train, and about noon called at the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Thomas Reid, Church street. His visit was ostensibly for the purpose of getting some clothes, a lariat and a pair of spurs, but he was in an ugly mood, and soon grew violent and abusive, and finally smashed some of the furniture. After his departure Mrs. Reid visited Police Magistrate Pattullo, and swore out a warrant for his arrest.

DESPERADO DREW A KNIFE.

Sam Speers and Constable Jas. Halbert set out last night to arrest Cook. They located their man about 10 o'clock on the north side of Broadway, right in the heart of the business section of the town. Cook retreated into Hughes and Norris' men's furnishing store, at the same time drawing an ugly-looking knife. The constables followed, and, avoiding a vicious slash with the knife, Halbert struck Cook with his baton and immediately grappled with the desperado. Cook retreated to slash at the constable, cutting him across the right wrist, severing muscles and arteries clear to the bone. As the officer's hand fell to his side powerless, Cook grasped his baton, wrested him free from Speers, who had first seized him by the shoulders, and made his escape to the street. Although a couple of hundred people had gathered, no attempt was made to stop him, and he walked quietly down the street, disappearing a few moments later. The blow which disabled Halbert severed the radial artery, and there was grave danger of the officer bleeding to death. He was taken to Dr. Henry's surgery, hear by, where the wound was dressed, and the physicians say he will never regain the use of his thumb and forefinger.

HAS A BAD RECORD.

Cook, who is about 30 years of age, has an unenviable record. He first came into prominence in the Autumn of 1906, when he got into trouble at Grand Valley Fall Fair, and was placed in the village lock-up. An hour or so after his arrest he broke jail, and walked out of the village carrying one of the prison bars as a memento. On Nov. 19th Constable Halbert, Chief Speers and High Constable Hughes attempted to arrest him in Orangeville. Cook drew a knife, and, after slashing Halbert across the left hand, got safely away. He spent the winter in the lumber camps, and on his return in March Constable Marshall attempted to arrest him. In a jiffy the constable was covered by a pair of revolvers, and his man backed away to a place of safety. A day or two later Cook was married to Florence Reid, the young couple leaving immediately for Oxbow. The North West Mounted Police arrested him soon after his arrival, but the authorities here decided not to bring him back. He was next heard of in Boise City, Idaho, where he was arrested for stealing a gun. He broke jail again, was re-arrested and sentenced for jail-breaking. Before completing his term he made a sensational escape, freeing twelve other prisoners at the same time.
