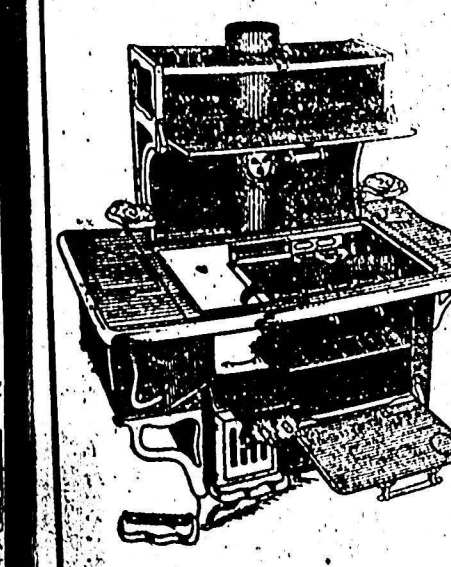
### LIQUOR HIDDEN BEHIND WALL

Two Score Bottles of Beer and Whiskey Said To Have Been Found in Paterson House.

Owen Sound, Nov. 13.—Licensee Inspector Matt Beckett has made another "round-up" of a remarkable nature. As a result of the raid, Alex. Franks, of the Paterson House, the leading hotel in town, faced Police Magistrate Treasurer yesterday afternoon.

charged with a violation of the local option by-law. It appears that the inspector visited the hotel in company with a constable, and after what seemed a thorough search of the entire place proceeded to investigate the walls under the stair leading from the ladies' entrance on the ground floor. He was attracted by the unusual way in which the shelving was put up. Search showed that the shelves and part of the wainscoting came easily away from the rest of the wall, and in the space thus revealed, it is alleged, were thirty-two bottles of beer and four bottles of ale. He found other movable boards in the wainscot, and other bottles hidden behind them. In all he captured eight bottles of whiskey and one of London dry gin, all of which, with the beer and ale, he and the constable
