The following instructions should be strictly observed so that the best market prices shall be at your command for your Poultry when marketing 1st-All poultry must be dry picked and inteked clean.

2nd-No feathers of any kind, wing or tail should be left on

3rd-Heads must be taken off all kinds boultry. 4th-Poultry requires to be slarved at leas 24 hours

so that nothing remains in their crips 5th-Under no consideration should poultry be scalded, as it lowers the market value of popultry 3 to 5c. lb. The above instructions strictly followed will always insure the marketing of poultry, at good prices.
