Baby Lived Two Hours

Father Gets Millions

A Brockville man, Mr. Chas. W. McLean, has fallen heir to \$3,000,000 as the result of peculiar circumstances attending the birth of his child and at its death one week ago. The case is a pathetic one. Mrs. McLean, formerly Mrs. Geo. A. Sherif, was a daughter of the late Senator Fullford. Her death took place one week ago, and her child lived only two hours after the mother had passed away. The estate of Mrs. Fullford, according to the terms of the will, amounted to only \$23,200. It was provided, however, in the late Senator's will that if a child was born it should inherit one-third of the whole estate. The estate is now valued at over \$9,000,000, and the infant was heir to \$3,000,000 during its lifetime of two hours. It, of course, died intestate, and the father, Mr. McLean, will now inherit the whole amount, according to law. Four years ago, when Senator Fullford died, the estate paid succession dues on \$5,250,000. Its value has nearly doubled since that time.
