### Looks Like a Late Spring

Rev. Irl R. Hicks in his Word  
and Works magazine for February,  
says: "The outlook for this month  
and the month of March following,  
is full of phenomenal probabilities.

### Mrs. Hugh Johnston.

On Friday night last, Jan. 28,  
about nine o'clock Mrs. Hugh  
Johnston died at her residence in  
Clarksburg, after a short illness.  
Mrs. Johnston has not been in her  
usual health for some time past.  
Shortly before Christmas she went  
on a visit to her son John, in  
Euphrasia, and had only been home  
a couple of weeks when the end  
came. The deceased was a woman  
respected by all who knew her and  
was in all cases a friend to the  
needy in time of trouble. She was  
an honest and consistent member  
of the Anglican Church all her life.  
Mrs. Johnston was one of the old-  
est members of Collingwood Town-  
ship Agricultural Society, and for  
27 years was an exhibitor in dairy  
products and ladies' work, always  
carrying off many prizes.

The subject of this short sketch  
was born in County Sligo, Ireland  
in 1831, and on February 26, 1861,  
was married to Hugh Johnston in  
the parish church at Arcadia, Sji-  
go. In May of the same year,  
they arrived in Canada, coming to  
Collingwood township, where they  
stayed for some time with Mr.  
John Irwin (now of Clarksburg),  
whose wife was a sister of Mrs.  
Johnston. For a number of years  
they farmed near Heathcote and  
then moved to lot 15, concession 7,  
Euphrasia, where they resided until  
moving to Clarksburg some 18  
years ago.

Besides her sorrowing husband  
she leaves to mourn a family of  
four daughters and two sons, viz:  
Robert, councillor of Euphrasia;  
John, on the old homestead; Mrs.  
Richard Miller, and Mrs. Thomas  
Brett, Euphrasia; Mrs. A. N. Noble  
of Meaford, and Mrs. Jos. Loug-  
heed of Clarksburg.

The funeral took place to Union  
Cemetery on Sunday afternoon,  
service being conducted by her  
pastor, Rev. E. Appleyard, in St.  
George's church, when a large num-  
ber of sorrowing relatives and  
friends paid a last tribute of re-  
spect to the deceased lady.—Thorn-  
bury Herald-Reflector.

### Muzzled Your Dog.

Spread of Rabies is to be Stopped—  
All Dogs West of Toronto and  
Barrie Must Be Muzzled.

In order to give every assistance  
possible to the Dominion authori-  
ties to suppress the outbreak of  
rabies in western Ontario, the Pro-  
vincial Cabinet has passed an order-  
in-Council, based on the recom-  
mendations of Dr. C. A. Hodgetts,  
secretary of the Provincial Board  
of Health, ordering that all dogs  
in Ontario west of a line drawn  
from Toronto to Barrie be either  
muzzled or chained up. Municipal-  
ities will be instructed to see that  
the orders are carried out. Posters  
have been issued by Dr. Rutherford,  
of Ottawa, and will be posted, up  
in all municipalities calling on all  
dog owners to muzzle the animals.  
This will be accompanied by a  
map showing the districts where  
rabies has broken out. The Pro-  
vincial Board of Health regard the  
outbreak of rabies as very serious,  
and the provincial police will co-  
operate in order to see that the  
greatest care and precautions are  
taken to prevent any further spread  
of the disease.
