BOXING BOUTS ATTRACT CROWDS

Interest in a remarkable degree was evinced in the boxing bouts which were held in Marsh Hall here on Thursday evening last, visitors being present from Durham, Dundalk, Meaford, and many other equally distant points. About 350 were in attendance, and everybody seemed well satisfied with the entertainment, provided, the opinion of those present being that the affair had been well and capably managed. Tom Galmore and D. Stewart, two local boys, opened the bill. Both boys proved to be good, clever boxers, and mixed it up in a good style. At the end of the third round the judges could not agree on a winner. The referee, Jimmy Kelly, ordered the boys to box another round. Stewart having a slight edge, was given the decision. The bout was very even. W. Dixon, of Hamilton, and Bert Hall, of Toronto, went on next for three hard rounds. Both boys were clever and hard hitters. Dixon did much the best of this bout and easily earned the decision. Dixon was a hard man to beat at his weight and will be heard from later. Tom Harvey and Garry Irwin boxed three rounds which was interesting. The referee decided this was a draw. The final bout of the evening was the round office between Jimmy Kelly, of Buffalo, and Jack Edwards, of Toronto, was one of the best bouts boxed off in Ontario for some time. Both these boys are very clever boxers and very cleverly worked and got away from many a well directed blow that was, and though a little lighter man, gave as good as he received on nearly all occasions. Kelly was much the cleaner boxer, and broke away clean every time, while Edwards continually hit in the clinches and had to be warned on several occasions. Kelly repeatedly tried a left swing which looked good for a knock-out but Edwards seemed to get away from it every time. The boys mixed it up freely for

the entire ten rounds and were both satisfied with the referee's decision of a draw, this being the second occasion on which these boys have boxed a draw. Another bout between these boys should pack the hall. The officials gave entire satisfaction. Dr. Campbell and Mr. J. C. Shute acted as judges. Mr. Kelly acted as referee in the first three bouts. Mr. E. M. Burk, of Toronto, officiated in the final bout of the evening.—Com.
