Municipal Council of the Village of Markdale met in the Council chamber on Monday evening, Feb. 28, at 8 o'clock. Reeve A. Jackson in the chair, all the members present. Minutes of last regular meeting, Jan. 31, 1910, read and adopted; also the special meeting, Feb. 14.

Woman's Missions.

The Woman's Missionary Auxiliary of the Methodist church held its annual missionary prayer meeting last Thursday evening in the Sunday School room of the church.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. Irwin, the wife of the pastor, took charge of the services and gave a brief resume of the work since its inception in 1880 and the marvellous increase from year to year. The income of the Society the first year after the union in 1884 was \$6421.15, and last year it reached the sum of \$106,780.56. We have thirty-eight lady missionaries in the foreign fields—Japan and China—besides bible women and native helpers. There has also been a good work done among our own Indians in B. C. as well as the Chinese and Japanese who have come to the Pacific coast, and also among the French Roman Catholics in Montreal.

Mrs. Roadhouse gave a brief reading from the report of one of our missionaries, who is working among the Gallicians, in Alberta. She says: "The fields are white unto the harvest. Now is the time to act, and to act full of faith and courage. I believe a well-equipped force, under both W. and M. S. and General Board could accomplish more than double the force of a few years hence."
