The Council met Feb. 12, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From the Municipal World, account. From County Treasurer, list of lands liable to be sold for taxes in 1910. From Ontario Good Roads Co. From Lucas, Raney & McArdle, re Continuation School. From C. H. Burgess & Co., re municipal debentures. From W. F. Dunn, re exchange of railway deeds. From J. A. McDonald and Alex. Ferguson, for the office of Assessor. By-Law 503, appointing Assessor, and By-Law 505, appointing Continuation School Trustees, was introduced and read a first and second time.

Firth-McNally—Appointing Continuation School Trustee be filled up with the name of George Walker and read a third time and passed.—Carried.

McNally—Weir—That Mr. McNally be authorized to examine timber on road allowance at lots 82 and 83, con. 3, W.T.R., and if he sees fit, sell the same.—Carried.

McNally—Weir—That M. Quillinan be paid \$25, as salary for collecting taxes in ward 3.—Carried.

Weir—McNally—That the Auditor's Report as re-audited by the Council, be adopted and that the Auditors be paid \$9 each for their services.—Carried.

Weir—McNally—That the report of Joseph Firth re Treasurer's surties be adopted and that he be paid \$1.00 for his services, and that Thos. Lander be paid \$1.00 for searches.—Carried.

Weir—McNally—That Wm. Vessie be paid 50 cents for repairing road at lot 25, P.G.R.—Carried.

Weir—McNally—That By-Law No. 503, to appoint Township officers, be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-Law Book.—Carried.

McNally—Firth—That the Municipal World be paid \$1.60 for supplies.—Carried.

Weir—McNally—That the Clerk be instructed to have 200 copies of the Auditor's Report printed.—Carried.

McNally—Weir—That the Clerk be instructed to prepare a By-Law readjusting Statute Labor.—Carried.

Firth—Weir—That John A. McDonald be appointed Assessor for the year 1910 at a salary of \$60, and that he be instructed to make personal calls on all rate-payers and to make a general raise of the assessment to the best of his judgment.—Carried.

McNally—Firth—That Edward Sullivan be paid \$7.00 for 3/4 cords of dry wood for Hall.—Carried.

Firth—Weir—That the Clerk be paid \$20 on salary.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to April 9, at 10 a.m. J. S. Black, Clerk.
