W. C. T. U. COLUMN Mother's Meeting.

An interesting and helpful Mother's Meeting was held on Friday evening, Feb. 11th, at the home of Mrs. Mark Armstrong, by the W.C.T.U., under the leadership of Mrs. T. Cook. The subject for discussion was "Purity in the Home." Mrs. Roadhouse gave a reading on "Our Ribbon White," being an answer to the following question asked by a gentleman at a W.C.T.U. Conference: "Will Mrs. Barney kindly explain what the 'white ribbon' ought to mean to the women who wear it?"

(1) It ought to mean "Purity" - purity of thought, word and deed that goes deep, goes into every part of our life; for it is the "pure in heart who shall see God." (2) "Consecration," -not only to Temperance but to Christ. (3) "Helpfulness" -walking in the footsteps of Him "who went about doing good." (4) "Loyalty" -first to Christ, and the work He has committed to us, then loyalty to each other -"one in Christ Jesus."

Mrs. Shepherd's reading was one of vast importance being "Pitfalls for our Boys" by Dr. J. H. Kellogg. He says "Of all the yawning pits which lie concealed beneath the feet of our boys just starting out upon life's pathway, none are more numerous than those through which so many thousands fall into the Stygian sea of impurity." Mothers must be wide-awake to the danger which lies in "evil-companionship" -foul-minded boys who are only too anxious to impart to an innocent lad the evil knowledge he has gained from some other boy missionary of evil. He says, "Vice spreads like wildfire. It is more catching than small-pox, and more tenacious, when once implanted, than the leprosy." Modesty and courtesy in deportment are safe-guards against impurity which no wise mother will neglect to cultivate in her boys while they are yet around the hearthstone. The mind must be filled with pure subjects in early life, for wicked, unwholesome thoughts spring up spontaneously, like weeds in an uncultivated garden. Many "self-deluded mothers" are willing to believe that other children are very bad, but their own little boys could not possibly be bad, thus they are led to neglect to inquire into the habits of their sons until the work of ruin has been wrought.
