

TO LEGALIZE SEVEN MARRIAGES

Special Act of Legislature Needed to Validate Contracts of Seven Young Couples.

Before seven young couples who recently went through the marriage ceremony in Ontario can be legally married, a special act of the Legislature will have to be passed to validate the contracts. The officiating clergymen in the seven instances were brought from the United States to perform the ceremony. These clergymen have been notified by Dr. C. A. Hodgetts, Registrar-General for Ontario, that their certificates are of no value in Ontario. As the circumstances are most embarrassing for the young people, no names are given.

But they cannot be re-married, for none of them can make declarations that they are bachelors or spinsters or widowers and widows. Dr. Hodgetts says the only way to make these marriages unquestionable in the eyes of the law is to pass a special act. In this statute the names of each couple will have to be given. Three of these couples live in Sault Ste. Marie.

Dr. Hodgetts recommends that the civil and religious ceremonies in connection with marriages be separate.
