A Large Map.

Dr. A. C. Crews, in "Onward" describes a huge map of the world which is under construction in London, England. It is to represent in actual dimensions one inch for every sixteen miles of the earth's surface, and will show every feature of land and water, with greater detail than has ever before been attempted by map-makers.

This map is the result of a conference of representative men from the largest nations of the world, called together by the British Government. The conference met at Bern, Switzerland, and planned for the map to be made in detachable sheets, each comprising four degrees of latitude and six degrees of longitude, or two hundred and forty miles in one direction and three hundred and sixty in another. These sheets will be fifteen inches by twenty-two and a half in dimensions, and will consist of five thousand four hundred all told.

This united effort on the part of so many government representatives will ensure accuracy of plan, and perfection of detail, for chances of national prejudice or bias will be entirely eliminated. The object of this gigantic enterprise is to extend more largely geographical knowledge, which will tend to bring the peoples of the earth more closely together, and thus promote international peace and fellowship.

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SUFFRAGETTE LIVED NEAR OWEN SOUND

Woman Who Created Scene at Prorogation of Legislature Came From Annan, Grey Co.

Miss Olivia Smith, a militant English suffragette, who lived in Annan, Sydenham township, Grey County, for fifteen years, was the woman who electrified those at the prorogation of the Legislature on Saturday, by rising in the Speaker's gallery and reminding the Lieutenant-Governor and his Prime Minister that the cause of women had been neglected. She has also been in England for a number of years.

Miss Smith was one of Mrs. Pankhurst's lieutenants, and like her leader, has been in Halloway jail. She wears the suffragette badge. It is of silver formed to represent prison bars.

"I acted on impulse and on the belief that such a cause might be more effective than are the present methods here," said Miss Smith, who is staying with friends at No. 26 Alice street. "I wondered afterwards if people here might think what I did was vulgar. I do not wish to have any more publicity."

DID NURSING AT COBALT.

Miss Smith is a nurse and has just returned from Cobalt, where she was engaged on fever cases. She is about 30 years old, and has been in every London suffragette demonstration of importance for the last four years. Three times she has been in jail.

CHAINED TO ASQUITH'S FENCE.

One of her adventures was the chaining of herself to the fence surrounding Premier Asquith's house on Downing street. Her plan was to address the crowd while the police were filing away the chains, and her scheme was a success. Before leaving Cobalt Miss Smith was presented by the miners with a cross of real silver as a token of their appreciation of her services.



Grand Trunk Pacific

Steady Progress Has Been Made Its Construction

Since the turning of the corner on the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the work has been proceeding steadily. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the construction work has proceeded rapidly. At the present time of the main line from Markdale to Rupert, a distance of 122 miles, a total of 3,000 miles has been placed under construction. There has been laid 1,275 miles of track, which in some cases consist of disconnected sections of therefore not all continuous. The portion of the line between Winnipeg to Edmonton, 772 miles, has been constructed and is in operation by the construction department for the past six months, and within the next few days the track has been laid continuously from Edmonton to Woll Creek, 122 miles, completing the track between that portion of the line between Woll Creek, 915 miles. The laying was also recently completed from Winnipeg to Fort Laramie, 445 miles, thus making a continuous line from Fort William, Winnipeg and Edmonton to Woll Creek, 1,360 miles, which cannot be completed for some months. Considerable work is required to be done on the eastern end and west ends of the line to put it in a able condition for the movement of regular trains.

In addition to the mileage referred to above, the provincial governments of Saskatchewan and Alberta have passed acts authorizing the construction of branch lines by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company in the Provinces, the construction of which are at present under way.
