### Grand Trunk Pacific.

Steady Progress Has Been Made in Its Construction.

Since the turning of the first sod in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway at Fort William, September 11, 1905, by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the construction work has proceeded steadily. At the present time, of the entire main line from Junction to Prince Rupert, a distance of 3,350 miles, a total of 2,000 miles has been placed under construction, and there has been laid 1,795 miles of track, which in some cases is made up of dismounted sections, and is therefore not all continuous. That portion of the line however, from Winnipeg to Edmonton, 793 miles, has been constructed and in partial operation by the construction department for the past eighteen months, and within the past 90 days the track has been completed continuously from Edmonton westward to Wolf Creek, 122 miles, thus completing the track-laying on that portion of the line, designated as the prairie section, Winnipeg to Wolf Creek, 915 miles. The track-laying was also recently completed from Winnipeg to Fort William, 415 miles, thus making a continuous line from Fort William, via Winnipeg and Edmonton, to Wolf Creek, 1,310 miles, which, however, cannot be completed for practical operation for some months, as considerable work is required to be done on the easterly and westerly ends of the line to put it in a suitable condition for the movement of regular trains.

In addition to the mileage referred to above, the provincial Governments of Saskatchewan and Alberta have passed acts authorizing guarantees for the construction of branch lines by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company in these provinces, the construction of which are at present under way. In

all out of a total mileage of main line and branches of approximately 7,900 miles, there have been completed and under construction at the present time, approximately 4,800 miles, or sixty per cent of the entire mileage authorized in the company's charters.

Chicago eggs were recently shipped to Toronto, bringing down the price of Canadian eggs four-cents a dozen.

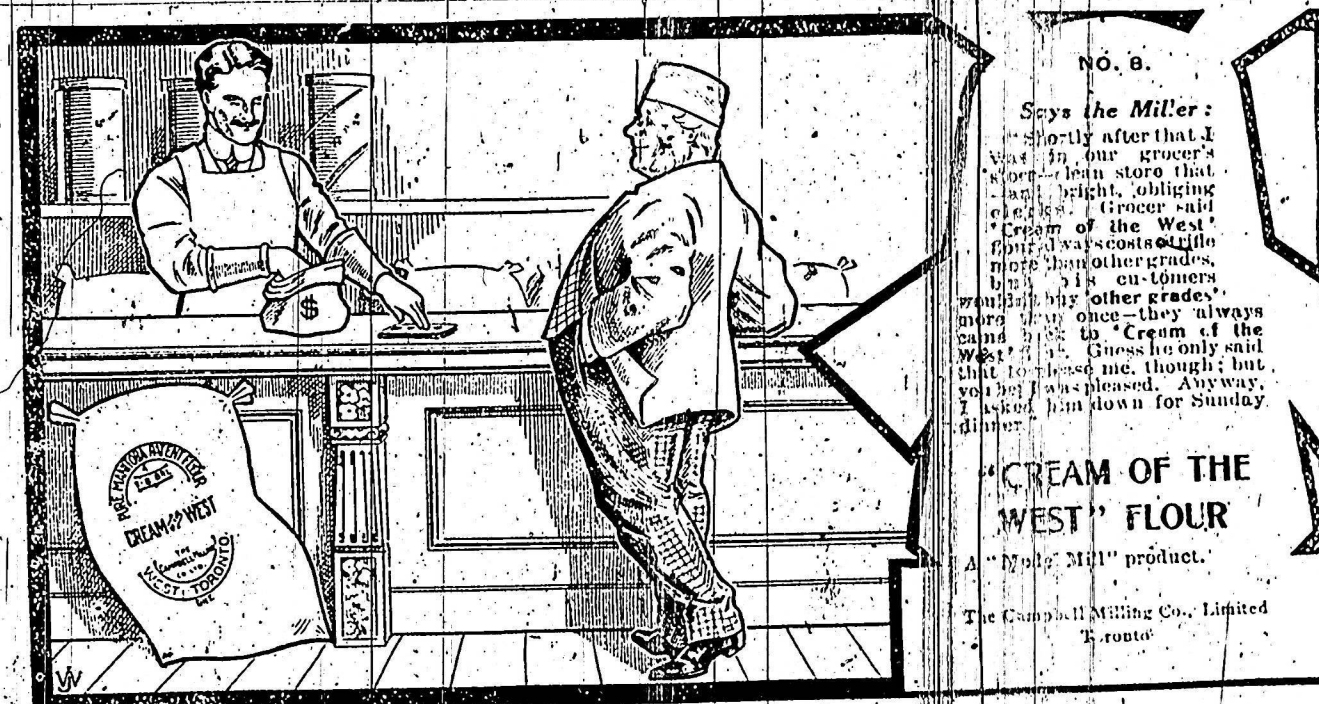
### SEEKING EX-MEMBERS QUEEN'S OWN RIFLES.

Request that all Communicate With the Secretary of the Regiment's Semi-Centennial Re-Union.  
 Several thousands of former members of the Queen's Own Rifles will assemble from all parts of the continent at Toronto next June, for a reunion in celebration of the Semi-Centennial of the regiment. The festivities will commence Saturday, June 18, with a reception at Government House, his Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, like many other notables being an ex-member of the crack regiment. On Sunday a monster Church Parade of ex-members and the present members will be a unique affair. During the week great historical pageants on a scale only equalled at the Quebec Tercentenary, will be given by

several thousand performers on the Rosedale Athletic grounds. In addition there will be numerous social meetings of old comrades.

Orangeville Will Be Dry According to the High Court Decision.
