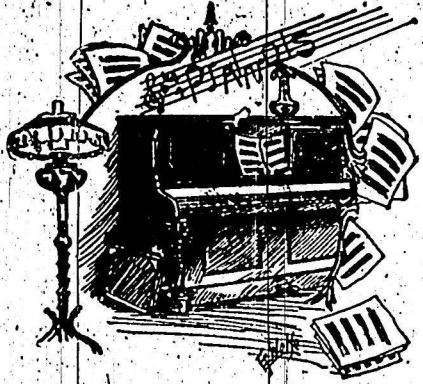

### Re Artemesia Continuation School

Editor Standard:—  
Please grant me space for a few remarks on an editorial in the "Advance," and steps taken to form this school. It says, "The topic uppermost in the minds of all at the present time and is being thoroughly discussed throughout the township, as it should be." Then adds, "Those discussing the matter, however, should remember that the project is secure." (That is when the Advance and a few others would prefer to discuss the matter. The manner in which it was "secured" is worth discussing. In February, 1909, invitations were given to all the school sections in the township to attend a meeting in Flesherton to form a Continuation School. Those wishing sent trustees. It was discussed pro and con. It was represented by the Flesherton people that there was a large room in the public school not in use they could have that would accommodate forty pupils or over. Some trustees east of Eugenia objected, saying their Section had said they had a school house to build and that they would have to help build one in Flesherton. They were told it might be years before it might ever be needed. Only four sections agreed and entered into an agreement for two years. Now, how could men represent to the County Council they were all agreeable? The Advance says, "There was no strong objection then to the formation of a district." When they said "no" at that meeting was that not an objection? County Councillors state they asked the representatives if the best of the township was satisfied, and they were told "yes." The Advance goes on to say, "The Sections as originally formed at least should unanimously support the School Board in their action." Turn to the title page of this sheet and read, "Truth before favor; principles, not men." Turn back the old files of this paper a few years ago and see what it said when men dared to deprive the people their rights to a vote. The electors will have due time to consider the enhanced value of their property, as pointed out by Mr. Best. Why accuse us with "sectional bias" and "a standpoint of ignorance?" Is that intelligent argument?  
Some hold that "opposition and even falsehood and misrepresentation pass away like snow with the heat of the glowing sun." Some think otherwise, County Councillors are surprised that men who have held high positions at the hands of the electors, and who do hold, should connive at truth and justice to gain an end. This helps to enrage the people.
