country, and the industries most
closely related to agriculture are the
first to respond to better times.
This was shown by the earnings of
the large milling companies in 1909.
Following the good crop of 1908, the average sur-
plus earnings on the common stock
of the three largest companies was
22.86 per cent. This compares
with an average of 10.82 per cent
for year 1908. The latter earnings
are based on the smaller crop of
1907. Thus, with a good crop in
1908, the milling industries showed
over double the earnings that they
had the previous year. Probably
no other industry in the country
would respond so readily to im-
