William Love Dead.—Death has claimed another highly respected old resident of Artemesia in the person of Mr. William Love, who passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wellington Smith, near Meaford, on Friday morning last. The remains were brought here for burial on Sunday and interred beside those of his wife. Rev. J. V. Taughland conducted the service at the grave. The deceased, who was in his 90th year, was born in Hampshire, England. At 16 years of age he came to Canada and after living a short time in Toronto settled in Whitechurch township where he was married to Miss Elizabeth McKay, who died 16 years ago. About 45 years ago he came to Artemesia and settled in the Stone Settlement. Ten years later he moved from near Markdale to Eugenia where he resided until six years ago he went to Meaford to live with his daughter, Mr. C. H. Love, of Ceylon, and Mrs. Smith are the surviving members of his family.

Mrs. Reid Dead.—At one o'clock on Tuesday morning of last week the grim reaper visited the home of Mr. Wm. Reid, who was bereft of his beloved wife, a kind-hearted and highly esteemed woman among her neighbors and friends. Though in poor health for some time, Mrs. Reid was not thought to be dangerously ill till Sunday evening when alarming symptoms developed and passing into an unconscious condition remained so until her spirit took its flight. Mr. Reid, who feels keenly his great loss, has the sincere sympathy of many friends. The deceased, who was 61 years and 8 months of age, was born in Scotland. Her maiden name was Isabella Ferguson. When quite young she came to Canada with her parents, who settled in Egremont township, where forty years ago she was married to Mr. Reid by Rev. Hugh Crozier, Presbyterian minister then at Drumore. After a few years in Egremont and a short time on the Manitoulin Island, Mr. and Mrs. Reid came to Artemesia and settled on the Durham Road where they lived for twenty-five years. Seven years ago they retired and settled here. The funeral took place to the public cemetery here on Wednesday afternoon. Service was conducted at the house by Rev. J. V. Taughland, assisted by Rev. H. E. Wellwood. Relatives from a distance who attended were: Mr. Wm. Allen and Mr. Abram Tuck, of Orchardville; Mr. and Mrs. Walter Ferguson, John and Alexander Ferguson, James Ferguson and sister, Miss Renwick, of Drumore. Mrs. J. O. Patton, of this place, is an adopted daughter of the deceased.

Mrs. McRae Dead.—At the ripe age of 80 years there passed away at her late home at Ceylon at 12.30 o'clock on Saturday morning last, Mrs. Alexander McRae, sr., a very highly respected woman who was among the earliest settlers in Artemesia township. The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Cairns, was born in Scotland. When but a child she came to Canada with her parents who were fifteen weeks on the ocean. They settled in King township and on the farm on which she was raised she was married 61 years ago to Mr. William Muir, of Caledon township. After marriage they lived at London for five years, when they came to Artemesia, then almost an unbroken forest, and purchasing 50 acres of land settled at what is now Ceylon on the lot where the deceased spent her last days. 38 years ago the deceased suffered a great loss, being left a widow with eight children to care for, three of whom predeceased their mother, viz., Margaret, Adam and Daniel. The surviving members are: Mrs. Walter Murdoch, of Caledon; Duncan, of Port Arthur; Mrs. W. M. Burnett, Flesherton; Mrs. John McFayden and Mrs. Alex. McFayden, of Ceylon. Thirty-one years ago the deceased was married to Mr. Alex. McRae, of Ceylon, who survives her with one stepson, Mr. Alex. McRae, jr. The funeral took place to Priceville Presbyterian Cemetery on Monday and the very large turn-out was a marked token of respect and sympathy for the bereft husband and family. The deceased was a lifelong member of

the Presbyterian Church, being for many years united with Chalmers Church here. Her pastor, Rev. G. S. Milligan, conducted the funeral service at the house and was assisted at the grave by Rev. J. A. First Emigrant Special on G.T.P.

Three Hundred Settlers From New England States and Eastern Canada Left Montreal for the West.

Montreal, April 7.—An important epoch in the history of the Grand Trunk Pacific will be marked tomorrow when their first emigrant special for the west will leave the Bonaventure station here. The train, the first of its kind on the new Transcontinental, will carry three hundred settlers from New England and eastern Canada points to Saskatchewan, going west over the Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific and their connections. They will travel on a complete Grand Trunk Pacific train of tourist and baggage cars, and will reach their destination early this week. It is expected that a number of other special trains over the new Transcontinental will be sent out from here during the season, as the rush of immigration to the west has led to a great demand for lands along the Grand Trunk Pacific in the far Western Provinces.

Lower Cost of Living.

(Toronto News.) While the whole country complains of the increasing expense of food, clothing and other necessities, it is interesting to note that the Ontario Government is able to report a marked decline in the cost of maintaining the inmates of the numerous public institutions under its charge. These institutions include the Provincial prisons, asylums and hospitals at Toronto, Brockville, Coburg, Hamilton, Kingston, London, Mimico, Orillia, Penetang and Woodstock. At the Toronto Hospital for the Insane the net cost of maintenance per capita per day was reduced from 47.52 cents in 1908 to 45.69 cents in 1909. At the Kingston Asylum the reduction was from 53.63 cents to 44.62 cents at Penetang from 52.62 cents to 43.79 cents, at the Hamilton Asylum from 38.70 cents to 35.82 cents. More or less similar economies were accomplished in one year at the other institutions. The best showing of all was effected at the Woodstock Hospital for Epileptics, where the cost of keeping one patient was brought down from 81.64 cents to 66.98 cents. The comparison includes the prices paid for provisions, clothing, medicines, light and heat, laundry and cleaning, repairs and replacements, office expenses and salaries.

Anti-Betting Bill Defeated

H. H. Miller's Measure Before Dominion Parliament Defeated by Narrow Margin

WHAT THE MILLER BILL PROPOSED

To abolish all gambling, particularly on horse races, but also, on any game of chance on anything else.

Ottawa, April 7.—After one of the most exciting nights witnessed in Parliament for some time, a bare majority of the House of Commons, with a sympathetic leaning towards the interests of the sports and the sporting institutions of a human race, blocked the bill introduced and ably sponsored by H. H. Miller, of South Grey, to suppress race-track gambling. The matter stands there, still possible of a compromise, but reached before the end of the session, but with the opponents of the bill insisting upon an amendment which in one respect at least, if adopted, have the effect of "centring the bookmaking and chances of any legislation, this session having a practical value remote. The promoters of the bill and those supporting it, met in a heavy fight, resisting to the end attempts to force upon the bill what they regarded as a half-measure that would defeat the aim aimed at, but they met with opposition which delivered them from unexpected quarters and benefited from the fact that the issue was decided in committee where members can vote by some degree of anonymity.

The climax in the struggle, reached when, after the debate, the general principle of the bill spent itself, the House in Committee of the Whole, proceeded to consideration of the clauses.
