AYLESWORTH RULES

He Declines to Disallow Ontario's Power Legislation.

IS A PROVINCIAL MATTER

Application to Have Hydro-Electric Schemes Declared Ultra Vires is Refused by the Minister of Justice In Report Presented Yesterday—It Relates Solely to Municipal Affairs, Says, Minister.

Toronto, April 23.—The Hydro-Electric power legislation passed by the Ontario Legislature, for which disallowance was asked by certain financial interests in Toronto and Montreal, and the petition for disallowance is refused. This is the substance of the report made by Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, to the Governor-General in council, and received at the Parliament buildings yesterday. In this finding, the Minister of Justice says:

The undersigned has carefully considered this legislation, and the various objections urged against it. The ground that the act is ultra vires of the Legislature, although taken by some of the petitions, and to some extent urged by counsel advocating the disallowance of the act, is, in the opinion of the undersigned, quite untenable. The act clearly relates solely to municipal institutions in the province, or matters merely of a local or private nature in the province, all of which are subjects declared by section 92 of the British North America Act, 1867, to be within the exclusive authority of the Provincial Legislature.

The act, for which a disallowance petition was drawn up, was passed last year by the Legislature to validate certain contracts entered into with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario. In this act, the contracts with the various municipalities were confirmed, although actions were commenced in the courts to have them declared void. The electrical interests went to Ottawa.

In his preamble, the Minister of Justice reviews the legislation, the act provided that the contracts with the municipalities should be varied in certain particulars, that the names of some municipalities should be stricken out and that of Ingersoll added, and in the recital, it is enumerated that in view of certain doubts as to the validity of the contracts in question, such doubts should be removed.

The strongest passage in the document, which consists of a dozen typewritten pages, is taken from an opinion of Sir Barnes Peacock, read on behalf of the Privy Council in the case of Hodge v. The Queen, which says:

"When the British North America Act enacted that there should be a Legislature for Ontario, and that its legislative assembly should have exclusive to make laws for the province and for provincial purposes in relation to the matters enumerated in section 92, it conferred powers not in any sense to be exercised by delegation from or as agents of the Imperial Parliament, but authority as plenary and as ample within the limits prescribed by section 92 as the Imperial Parliament in the plenitude of its power possessed and could bestow. Within these limits of subject and area, the local Legislature is supreme, and has the same authority as the imperial Parliament, or the Parliament of the Dominion."

Customs Frauds at New York. New York, April 23.—George F. Bedell, who was chief clerk for James F. Vaill, former deputy surveyor of the port, and who had charge of the weighing department, was arrested yesterday by United States Marshal Henkel, on an indictment charging conspiracy to defraud the Government out of customs duties.

Yesterday afternoon Marshal Henkel arrested Charles D. Drew and Charles H. Wardwell, former assistant customs weighers. The prisoners bailed each on charges connecting them with Bedell. Bedell is held in \$5,000 bail.

Killed by a Live Wire. New Liskeard, April 23.—William R. Eaton, a porter, was instantly killed in the Windsor Hotel. He went into the cellar to change an electric globe, and the current being on, his hands came in contact with a live wire. He was standing on a rickety floor, and death was instantaneous. He was 21 years of age and was from Ottawa.
