SIR JAMES REPLIES

He Comments on the Aylesworth Hydro Decision.

BEGINNING OF A NEW ERA

Premier's Statement Has an Air of "I Told You So" Running Through It and Contains an Attack on Those Who Opposed the Power Legislation of Ontario Government in the Courts.

Toronto, April 23.—After a few days' consideration Sir James Whitney has issued his promised statement commenting upon the report of the Minister of Justice in answer to the petition for disallowance of the Hydro-Electric Act of 1909.

Sir James' comments are characteristic, and his sentences almost say, "I told you so." He says:

"The decision of the judicial committee of the Privy Council in the cases of the Florence Mining Co. and refusal of the Dominion Government to disallow the Ontario statute known as the Hydro-Electric legislation of 1909, together mark the beginning of a new era in constitutional development under the British North America Act."

It is now certain that in the future there will be no further attempts—at any rate no successful attempts—to minimize, or destroy, the powers of a Provincial Legislature acting within the limits of its jurisdiction.

"The unfair and dishonest methods adopted against this legislation, which I can only touch upon in passing, prove clearly that when men's pockets govern their action they are not, as a rule, particular as to the nature of the means they are willing to adopt in order to succeed."

From the beginning, the electric interests in Toronto and elsewhere were the bitter opponents of this legislation. All the stock gamblers were against it. An emissary was sent over to England and the so-called financial journals here blossomed out with editorials made up very largely of misrepresentation, and "frigid calculations."

One of Mr. Clemens' last acts was to draw a check for \$6,000 as his contribution towards the building fund. Mr. Clemens also gave a great part of his private library to the institution.

Greatest Humorist.

London, Eng., April 23.—The Daily Mail says that it is no exaggeration to say that Mark Twain was the greatest humorist of the modern world had known.

"With the exception of Tolstoi," says The Morning Leader, "probably there is no writer whose death would cause more universal emotions of respect and regret."

"Huck Finn" Weeps.

Paris, Mo., April 23.—B. C. M. Barney, nothing said to be the original of "Huckleberry Finn," went when he heard of Mark Twain's death. "The old days are passing," he said, "even the long sweep of the majestic Mississippi seems to have dwindled. The noise of its traffic and the music of its deep-throated whistles, are practically no more. The man who put into words for the delight of the world the pictures of the great river is dead."

To the applications for disallowance an answer was put in by the Provincial Government. The same great pressure was again brought into play, and when, if ever, the secret history of this matter is made public the people will, indeed, be amazed. Those who have looked through a red-covered pamphlet entitled, "The Credit of Canada: How it is Affected by the Ontario Legislature," will be able to form some idea of the efforts that were made, and to roughly estimate the amount of money which was expended.

"Well, the efforts of the men who would have taken away from the Provincial Legislature the right to legislate within its jurisdiction, except as and when permitted by the Dominion Government, have failed, and the question has been settled forever. This being so, it is unnecessary to speculate on which would have occurred had the statute been disallowed, beyond saying that the province would not have submitted and would have lost no time in taking such steps as would have put an end to the situation."

Amateur Editors at Falls.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 23.—To allow Mayor Dores, aldermen and others, criticized by him to give their side of the story, proprietor J. E. P. Rothwell turned over the publication of The Record to a committee of citizens for next Wednesday. The entire news, matter and editorials will be written by amateurs. The proceeds for advertising will be donated to the general hospital.

The U. S. Heating & Lighting Co., capitalized at seventeen millions, has located across the river. An effort will be made to secure the Canadian plant for this city. Canadians are financially interested in the concern.

Death of J. S. Larke.

Ottawa, April 23.—The Department of Trade and Commerce received yesterday a cable from Sydney, Australia, conveying information of the death of J. S. Larke, Canadian trade commissioner there. Mr. Larke was appointed by Sir Mackenzie Bowell in 1894, and was the first Canadian trade commissioner. Previously he was editor of the Oshawa Vindicator. He was a strong protectionist, and had considerable reputation as a public speaker. Two years ago he made a tour of Canada, addressing boards of trade. He was 70 years of age and a widower. He was a native of England, but came to Canada when a lad.

Gaekwar of Baroda Coming.

Vancouver, April 25.—Sir Sayaji Rao, Gaekwar of Baroda, one of the most influential of the independent princes of India, will arrive from Yokohama on a tour of the American continent June 15. Hindus of British Columbia will act as their mediator at Ottawa in an effort to secure some mitigation of the restrictions of British Asiatic subjects.
