## SIR JAMES REPLIES FUNERAL IS QUIET

He Comments on the Aylesworth Hydro Decision.

### BEGINNING OF A NEW ERA

Premier's Statement Has an Air of "I Told You So" Running Through It and Contains an Attack on Those Who Opposed the Power Legislation of Ontario Government in the Courts.

Toronto, April 23.—After a few days' consideration, Sir James Whitney has issued his promised statement commenting upon the report of the Minister of Justice in answer to the petition for disallowance of the Hydro-Electric Act of 1909.

Sir James' comments are characteristic, and his sentences almost say, "I told you so." He says:

"The decision of the judicial committee of the Privy Council in the cases of the Florence Mining Co. and refusal of the Dominion Government to disallow the Ontario statute known as the Hydro-Electric legislation of 1909, together mark the beginning of a new era in constitutional development under the British North American Act."

"It is now certain that in the future there will be no further attempts—at any rate no successful attempts—to minimize, or destroy, the powers of a Provincial Legislature acting within the limits of its jurisdiction."

"The unfair and dishonest methods adopted against this legislation, which I can only touch upon in passing, now clearly show that when men's pockets govern their action they are not, as a rule, particular as to the nature of the means they are willing to adopt in order to succeed."

"From the beginning, the electric interests in Toronto and elsewhere were the bitter opponents of this legislation. All the stock gamblers were against it. An emissary was sent over to England, and the scented financial journals here dishonestly out with editorials made up very largely of misrepresentation, and 'frigid calculated falsehoods.' The result, however, has proved disastrous to the idea that these journals have any real power or influence. Every imaginable influence over there—social, political, private and public—was retained where possible, and all who realize the strength of their combined influences in London will at once appreciate what this means."

"Then, emissaries were sent out among the farmers owning land over which the transmission line was to pass, loaded up with all manner of falsehoods, by means of which to spread anxiety and alarm among the people. Last, and also least—the opposition of the legislature after proclaiming abroad the virtues of producer gas, the defects of electric power, and the general wickedness of the legislation, finally settled down alongside the electric interests, and has remained there ever since, doing all in its power to destroy the Hydro-Electric scheme. Through all this time of stress and peril, the press of Ontario, in the main, stood squarely by the provincial position."

"To the applications for disallowance an answer was put in by the Provincial Government. The same great pressure was again brought into play, and when, if ever, the secret history of this matter is made public the people will be amazed and appalled. Those who have looked through a red-covered pamphlet entitled, 'The Credit of Canada; How it is affected by the Ontario Legislature,' will be able to form some idea of the efforts that were made, and to roughly estimate the amount of money which was expended."

"Will the efforts of the men who would have taken away from the Provincial Legislature the right to legislate within its jurisdiction, except as and when permitted by the Dominion Government, have failed and the question has been settled forever. This being so, it is unnecessary to speculate on which would have occurred had the statute been disallowed beyond the province would not have submitted and would have lost no time in taking such steps as would have put an end to the situation."

**Amateur Editors at Falls.**  
Niagara Falls, Ont., April 23.—To allow Mayor Doherty, aldermen and others criticized by him to give their side of the story, proprietor J. E. P. Rothwell turned over the publication of the Record to a committee of citizens for next Wednesday. The entire news matter and editorials will be written by amateurs. The proceeds for advertising will be donated to the general hospital.

Only Relatives and Friends to See Mark Twain's Obsequies.

### MEMORIALS ARE PLANNED

Henry Van Dyke Preaches the Sermon at the Service in New York This Afternoon, After Which the Remains Go to Elmira—Reading, Conn., Is to Have Memorial Library as Monument.

New York, April 23.—A simple funeral service over the body of Samuel L. Clemens, will be held in this city this afternoon. The body will then be taken to Elmira, N.Y., where it will be buried beside those of his wife and children. Later a public memorial service will be held in a large hall.

Dr. Henry Van Dyke of Princeton University will preach the funeral sermon today, which will be held at the Brick Presbyterian Church, 37th street and Fifth avenue, at 3 o'clock. The service will be attended by only relatives and close friends of the dead author. There will be no pallbearers, and although final arrangements have not been made the service probably will consist of merely a short address by Dr. Van Dyke. There probably will be no music. The body will be brought to New York from Reading, Conn., on a special car.

At Elmira another simple service will be held. This service will probably be at the home of Gen. Langdon, a relative of Mr. Clemens' wife, and so far as now known will consist simply of a short address by Jos. Twitchell of Hartford, Conn., who was one of Mr. Clemens' oldest friends.

**Memorial Library.**  
Reading, Conn., April 23.—The free public library which the literary colony here is building, will start as a permanent monument to the town's most distinguished citizen. The building is to be known as the "Mark Twain Memorial Library."

One of Mr. Clemens' last acts was to draw a check for \$6,000 as his contribution towards the building fund. Mr. Clemens also gave a great part of his private library to the institution.

**Greatest Humorist.**  
London, Eng., April 23.—The Daily Mail says that it is no exaggeration to say that Mark Twain was the greatest humorist the modern world has known.

"With the exception of Tolstoy," says The Morning Leader, "probably there is no writer whose death would arouse more universal emotions of respect and regret."

**"Huck Finn" Weeps.**  
Paris, Mo., April 23.—B. C. M. (Barney) Farthing said to be the original of "Huckleberry Finn," wept when he heard of Mark Twain's death. "The old days sweep of the majestic Mississippi seems to have dwindled. The noise of its traffic and the music of its deep-throated whistles, are practically no more. The man who put into words for the delight of the world the pictures of the great river is dead."

All business places and city offices will be closed on the day of the funeral and memorial services will be held at the same hour as the services in the east.

A movement has been started to have Clemens' boyhood home purchased by the state, and State Senator McAllister said that a bill to this effect would be introduced in the next Legislature.
