EVA SUTER FREED IT WILL END WAR

Jury Not Satisfied of Her Guilt in Child Murder Case. Secretary Knox Is Enthusiastic Over Arbitral Court.

GIRL'S STORY IS UNSHAKEN ARMAMENTS WILL DWINDLE

Young Woman on Trial at Bracebridge Charged With Killing Her Illegitimate Two-Year-Old Child Displays the Utmost Composure on Witness Stand—Answered in Straightforward Manner.

Bracebridge, April 22.—Doubt caused the jury to bring in a verdict of "Not Guilty" at 10.15 last night, in the case of Eva Suter, charged with murdering her two-year-old illegitimate child on Sept. 20 last. A motive for the murder was not discovered. It took place in a swamp a few hundred yards from the Suter home, about 12 miles from here.

The girl told a story which was unshaken by the crown, accusing her father, but he established a fairly good alibi. T. E. Godson gave an excellent address to the jury. This is the first capital case Justice Middleton has tried. The case went to the jury at 9.45 p.m.

While addressing the jury, O. M. Arnold, for the crown, said: "No sane man will believe her when she says her father committed the crime," but the verdict was received with pleasure. Applause was quelled just in

time to prevent an uproar. "I agree with you," said the justice. Eva Suter is either heartless, possessed of almost unnatural self-control, or unable to comprehend her position. Until the commencement of her attorney's address to the jury at 7.15 p.m., she showed no emotion. Then she produced a handkerchief, bowed her head and covered her face. From her bearing during the day one would think she did it for effect.

When she arrived at the court, she was decidedly composed. While chatting with her lawyer, she smiled now and again. Her complexion was pale and cheek bones prominent, due to her long confinement. She acted unflinchingly when cross-examined, answering all questions in a straightforward manner. Her manner was of indifference to the result.

Fatal Shooting at Shawville, Que.—Ottawa, April 22.—Mike Murphy and his wife, Eysies, are under arrest at Shawville, Pontiac County, Que., as a result of a shooting Wednesday night, in which Harry Howes and Willie Dale lost their lives. Murphy chased seven or eight young men who had been teasing him and his wife, firing four shots from a shotgun. Remarkable evidence was given at yesterday's inquest. One shot caused sixty wounds.

Riots Are Spreading. Pekin, April 22.—The lawlessness of the natives which began at Changsha, the capital of Hunan Province, is reported to be spreading. Advice received here state that riots have occurred at Ning Siang, the site of a Protestant mission, about 30 miles west of Changsha. A mission school of 200 pupils, 100 miles north of Ning Siang has been burned. The foreigners are said to have escaped harm.

Postoffice Robbers Sentenced. Richmond, Va., April 22.—Pleading guilty to the robbery of the Richmond postoffice on the night of March 29, when \$88,000 was taken, Eddie Day and "Little Dick" Harris yesterday were sentenced to ten years in the Atlanta Penitentiary and fined \$6,000 each.

A Case of Leprosy. New York, April 22.—Suffering from what is believed to be leprosy in its advanced stage, an unfortunate woman, cuddling an eight-months-old baby to her breast, was found by Dr. Trask, of Bellevue Hospital yesterday. The woman was discovered living in a squalid east side tenement.

Lock-Out Will Be Settled. Berlin, April 22.—The lock-out in the building trades in Berlin will in all probability be settled, in consequence of a decision by the trades arbitration court, granting the men a small increase in wages, beginning Aug. 15, with a further increase on Oct. 1.

Protection For the Birds. Albany, N.Y., April 22.—The bill prohibiting the sale in New York State of the plumage of birds belonging to any family that is represented by birds native to the state, passed the Senate yesterday with but three votes against it.

Laborites Have Working Majority. Sydney, N.S.W., April 22.—A majority of ten in the Senate and thirteen in the House for the Labor party is the final result of the general election here.
