Petitions for Extra Train. Horse Races at Markdale

Petitions are in circulation in Walkerton, Hanover and Durham, asking the C.P.R. to run a daily passenger train through from Walkerton to Owen Sound. The petitioners ask for a train leaving Walkerton at 6.30 a.m. - the regular train for Saugeen Junction - and reaching Owen Sound about 9.20 a.m.; returning to leave Owen Sound about 10 a.m., connecting at Saugeen Junction with the train from Toronto. The petitions are being freely signed, and we are informed, on what we consider good authority that there is every prospect that the railway Co. will give the new service a trial, and if found a paying proposition, continue and probably extend it.

If inaugurated, the service will be of especial benefit to the people of Markdale and Flesherton, who would be able to reach Owen Sound at 9.20, have from then until 3.10 to transact their business, and be home soon after four o'clock. Visitors from the Walkerton branch would have the same length of time in town and one of the four-hour waits at Saugeen Junction would be cut out.

Steamboat Express.

The C. P. R. will put on the Steamboat Express on the local branch commencing Saturday, May 21st. Although not as early as expected the first train will be a full week earlier than last year. The express will leave Toronto at 11 p.m. every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday. The south bound trains leave Owen Sound every Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, but the hour has not yet been announced.

Astronomers hope that this visit of the comet will enable them to determine absolutely the size of the nucleus and its composition. Comets are composed of three parts, the nucleus, the head, and the tail. The nucleus is the centre of the head, and it is known that the head is of the same composition as the tail, only denser. When comets pass between the earth and stars it is possible to see the stars through both the tail and the head, which is one proof that both are transparent, but it has never happened that the nucleus of a comet has been in such position between the earth and a star that the astronomers could tell whether or not the star would show through the nucleus as well as through the head. - Popular Mechanics.
