**Mounting Weeds and Flowers.**

Editor Standard.—  
Der Sir,—Seeing the offer made by Euphrasia Agricultural Society to give prizes for mounted weeds and wild flowers, if you will permit me space, I will say a little as to how it should be done.

All plants should be gathered when in bloom and carefully spread out and pressed between blotting paper (other paper will do) to dry. When dry have fish glue (common will do) applied to back of plant; then place on paper and leave pressed until dry. The only suitable paper I could procure was from the Seed Department, Ottawa, and an Art Emporium in Toronto. The size I used was 10x12 inches. Should the plants be longer than that, cut in two. It is well to show part of the root. Perhaps Mr. L. A. Newman, Sec. Seed Growers' Association, would furnish small slips of paper on which is printed botanical name, English name, etc. if told what they were wanted for: to be glued under each plant. The Botanical or Latin name is valuable in this way: Take "Cominon Groundsel"; Botanical name, "Senecio vulgaris"; Senecio is the Latin for "Old Man." A farmer in Euphrasia, in describing the weed, said when ripe it was white on top. When they are all ready anyone can come and copy the names from mine. We have about 200 mounted. By collecting two plants and sending one to the Seed Department, Ottawa, they will give the name, and they are mailed free by you. I can tell where all mine grew. Along railroads is a great place to find them. If gatherers come to Guelph on the Excursion June 25th I will assist all I can. A person is well repaid for time and trouble, the pleasure it gives in after life, beside the benefit you can do to others. Only last week I found a very dangerous weed, "Stinkweed" (*Thlaspi Arvense*, L., on a farm near Markdale, the first I have seen. It is so bad in the West that the Chief Weed Inspector, J. N. Willing, has caused a colored picture of this weed to be placed in every school in the Territories, so that the teachers and students might become familiar with the appearance of Stinkweed (*Thlaspi Arvense*, L.).

**THE WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC**

Extract from the Address of Mrs. Gordon Wright, the Dominion President of the W.C.T.U.

(Continued from last week.)  
Despite this international effort we are compelled to state that this traffic is more firmly entrenched than ever. We communicated with the Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, asking what Canada or its Government was doing towards the suppression of this nefarious traffic. The following is an extract from a full and courteous reply: "There has been no legislation, as you seem to understand, it having been considered that the existing law of Canada was, if properly applied, entirely adequate to the ends proposed by the convention entered into at Paris on the 18th of May, 1910, by the various European Governments. Canada, has, therefore, adhered to the convention as is provided for by the declaration signed by the plenipotentiaries and Col. Arthur Percy Sherwood, C.M.G., Commissioner of Dominion Police, Ottawa, has been designated as the authority mentioned in Art. I., as authorized on behalf of Canada to correspond with the authorities appointed by the other States, as well as with the central authority at Scotland Yard. It may save misapprehension to point out that the application of the law in each case is a matter for Provincial authorities."

Evidently the existing law of Canada is not "properly applied," else this iniquity could not flourish. It may be that many do not realize that this hideous traffic has already honeycombed our land. We believe we have not a single Province where the agents are not busy seeking to entrap and ensnare innocent, unsuspecting young womanhood. Just recently there came to us most reliable words from one of the Provinces by the sea that two young women under the guise of doing evangelistic work were winning recruits for the gateway of hell.

It is said that headquarters of this traffic are situated in Chicago and New York, which form distributing centres for every land. Hon. Edwin W. Sims states that hirings of this traffic are stationed at certain points of entry in Canada where numbers of emigrants are landed to secure victims from those unprotected or unaccompanied by friends. Oh, women of Canada, for the sake of the integrity of our young nation, for the sake of the souls going out in the blackest of unspeakable infamy; yes, for the sake of the Christ who died to redeem them, let us arouse ourselves and do something, if possible, to stem this dark tide of iniquity.—Missionary Outlook.
