The Manufacturing End.

The manufacturing end of our
town is a busy section just now. Saugeen
Lodge No. 327 I.O.O.F.,
Manager Bushfield is running the
furniture factory full time and has
orders sufficient for months to
come, yet keeping up with engage-
ments. The quality and finish of at-
tention is highly spoken of by an-
dealers; resulting in repeat orders.
Under the management of
Mr. J. G. Ferris the fine
stock of factory logs are being cut
out in Mr. C. B. Armstrong's new,
saw mill, while the Armstrong
venner factory, now in operation, is
turning out a superior quality of
cheese-box veneer. Nearly seventy
hands are now employed in these
industries.

Then a little further west is
Minis Bros. saw mill and sash
and door factory in full operation.
They have been cutting their hard-
wood stock, which was finished this
week, and the soft wood entered
upon. Twenty-two hands are here
employed at present.

Ford's roller mill, too, in the
west end, is kept busy, as also his
chopper at the power house of the
town waterworks plant.

Mr. Thos. Mercer wishes to an-

discontinued in future. Saturday
they will remain. Lifeguard goes to help


