

# Flesherton Happenings

After a long and trying illness, Mrs. Charles Irwin, widow of the late Mr. Charles Irwin, passed peacefully away on Thursday last at the home of her son, Samuel, near the village. Mrs. Irwin was among the early settlers who came here fifty years ago, and but few of her early neighbors remain. She was an industrious woman, a kind neighbor, and good wife and mother. Her children will long remember her Christian example before them. She was converted early in life in the Old Country, and, uniting with the Methodist Church here in its early days, remained a faithful member. The funeral took place to the public cemetery on Saturday, and was largely attended. The service, which was held at the house, was conducted by Rev. Mr. Wellwood, assisted by Rev. Mr. Milligan. The deceased, whose maiden name was Elsie Hemphill, was born in the County Fermanagh, Ireland, in the year of the birth of our late beloved Queen Victoria, and was therefore in her 91st year. In the year 1839 she was married to her late husband, also of Fermanagh, with whom she came to Canada in 1860, landing by boat at Bowmanville, after six weeks' ocean voyage. A few weeks later Mr. Irwin brought his family to Artemesia, the journey from Bowmanville being made on foot. Mr. Charles Irwin, of this place, the eldest of the children, and then thirteen years of age, remembers well the two days' tramp. But their new home was safely reached and the courage and toil of those early days met with due reward. Mr. Irwin died about twenty years ago. The family consisted of three sons and five daughters, one of whom, Mrs. Robert Thompson, died in 1904. The surviving members are: Charles, Flesherton; Mrs. Geo. Murphy, West Toronto; Mrs. Neil McPhail, Kenora; Mrs. John Chislett, Ceylon; Oliver, Elk Lake; Samuel, on the homestead; and Mrs. Jacob Thompson, Flesherton. Deep and widespread sympathy is felt for the family of Mr. William Fisher, and also his son-in-law, Mr. James Pedlar, 4th line, on account of sudden and very sad bereavement in their homes last week. At Mr. Fisher's, scarlet fever developed in two of his children, a boy of 8 and girl of 6 years of age, and after only a few days' illness, the little girl, Irene, died quite unexpectedly, a great shock to her parents. The boy, whose life appeared in greater danger, is, we are pleased to learn, recovering. At Mr. Pedlar's, the day following the former death, their eldest child, a boy nearly two years old, died about an hour after taking some tablets left by the doctor for his mother who was ill. The little one unfortunately secured the tablets unknown to those in attendance. The doctor was speedily summoned but was unable to save its life. The death in this case was also a

An International Railway Board is to be formed to regulate lines that cross the Canada-United States boundary.

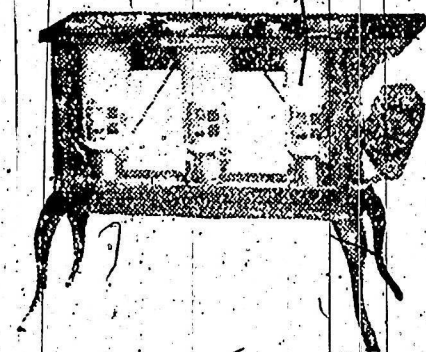
## Big Affair for Owen Sound Million-Dollar Shipbuilding Plant to be Erected.

A syndicate of English capitalists will construct a million-dollar shipbuilding and repair plant and two drydocks at Owen Sound. An agreement has just been signed with the town by Mr. Edward Box, their representative, who, for the past month, has been sizing up the shipping of the great lakes and visiting the different ports before deciding on the best point to locate. The plant will be built on the C.P.R. waterfront there, and that company is taking a block of stock in the concern.

The industry is by far the largest concern ever in prospect for the town. The company proposes to build in Owen Sound two drydocks, a graving dock 650 feet long, and a floating drydock, capable of handling steamers up to 200 feet in length, and, in addition, to put in a shipbuilding and repairing plant. The yard plans will include building berths for three vessels, so that three boats may be under construction at the same time. Complete machine shops, boiler shops, etc., will be built, and a large modern plant for the handling of large shipbuilding contracts erected. The construction will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000.

The ratepayers of Owen Sound will vote on a by-law granting a bonus of \$50,000, and sanctioning the taking stock for \$50,000.

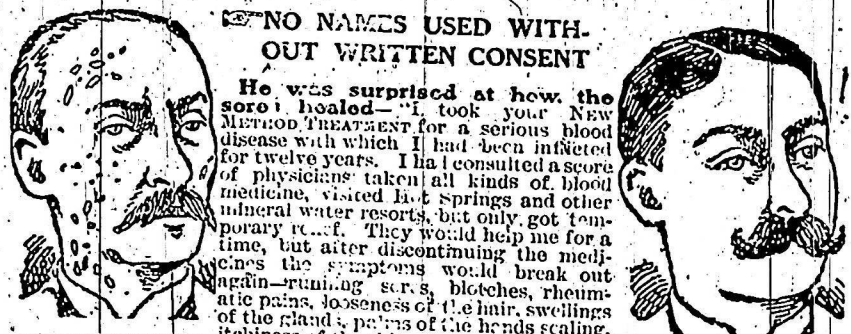
